

Fran (née Baker) and Fred Taylor run a successful chain of discount retail stores in Kentucky and they're cautiously expanding: Ataris and Hot Wheels, new branches and new management. With four healthy children and financial stability their own parents could have only dreamed of, Fred and Fran are the American dream: rags to riches, a family dynasty built on years of hard work and long hours. Underneath the surface, however, the business is changing at a breakneck pace, and each member of the family is struggling to keep up.





After a decade of miscarriages, Brooke Jensen is finally pregnant — with quadruplets. But when she unexpectedly goes into labor after just twenty-three weeks, she's plunged into the terrifying and mysterious world of the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, where a team of doctors and nurses work around the clock to save her surviving children. Frightened and confused, and increasingly at odds with her local newscaster husband, Brooke bonds with Dash Coenen, a senior nurse whose own son had been born prematurely and had been, like Brooke's babies, a patient in the NICU. Now nearing his eighteenth birthday, Dash's son Landon is growing increasingly violent and straining his parents' abilities to care for him.

Set on the shore of a sprawling, wooded lake, Hanover, Wisconsin has fallen on hard times in the wake of the Great Recession. The paper mills that once drove the region's economy have begun to close, leaving many in town, including Dash's husband, working odd jobs to make ends meet. A series of devastating events thrusts Landon out of the only home he's ever known and sends Brooke fleeing the hospital in the company of a sketchy fellow NICU parent. Holed up in a ramshackle cottage on the lake's ice-bound northern shore, Brooke encounters a little girl, all but abandoned by her drug-addled father, a meeting that helps Brooke find the courage to reclaim her future as a mother. Interweaving the stories of Brooke and Dash, Everything We Could Do illuminates the ways families are formed and remade in times of crisis.








BOOK ONE: THE EDGE OF THE CRAZIES


BOOK THREE: AN UNFORTUNATE PRAIRIE OCCURRENCE



Sumnima and Rita are teenage cousins growing up in a remote Nepalese village, dreaming of a larger life than being married off and becoming a servant in a strange man's household. Sumnima, the fearless elder one, is eager to join the leftist rebels and take a stand against men like her abusive and alcoholic father but Rita - younger and more studious - is cautious. When Sumnima start sneaking off into the forests to train with the guerillas and takes up with a boy from a lower caste, Rita is left alone. Feeling angry and forgotten, Rita betrays Sumnima and her friends to the Nepalese secret police and sets in motion events that upend all their lives. After rebel forces are killed by government troops in their mountain village, Sumnima disappears and Rita becomes a danger to herself, her mother and aunt. Sent to Kathmandu where she will be safe, Rita is exposed to a larger world for the first time. But caste and class still matter as Rita discovers living in the glamorous and traditional household of the Jarsap, a prominent Nepalese general.

Now a servant to the elderly and formidable Ranisab, the General's mother, Rita must decide who she wants to be and reckon with her decisions. Full of authentic details and insights, Beyond the Mango Trees is based on historical events at the turn of the 21st century. Like a Nepalese "Downton Abbey," the novel gives readers an insider's view of the mansions and customs of the wealthy in Kathmandu.



MONICA RANA's family were the hereditary Prime Ministers of Nepal from 1846 until 1951. The author grew up in Kathmandu before attending Harvard University. While at Harvard she studied with Jamaica Kincaid, Samantha Chang and Patricia Powell and won the Cyrilly Abels Short Story Prize in 2004, the Edward Eager Award for Fiction in 2003 and was published by the Harvard Advocate. She now lives in London where she works in finance.


Set in Pittsburgh - a true city of clans - after the devastating 2008 financial crisis has taken hold, the novel follows Jeremy, a sexually confused young man as he struggles with a close friendship gone awry and how to separate himself from his family's expectations of who he is and isn't. The son of a former professional baseball player, Jeremy has grown up playing sports and following the rules for being a certain type of "tough guy" even though it's destroying his soul and spirit.

But when Scott, his best friend and roommate becomes a sexual predator, Jeremy is forced to confront everything he has tried to suppress in order to find his way back to his family and his one true friend. This moving debut novel melds elements of The Art of Fielding in how it describes the joy of baseball as a physical endeavor and Paul Murray's The Bee Sting as it explores one family's brokenness and enduring love.

The undertaking is not for the faint of heart—the Channel is nearly twenty-one miles across at its narrowest point, full of jellyfish and enormous shipping vessels, with water temperatures, even at the height of summer, hovering near (and often below) 60 degrees. Indeed, far more people have climbed Mount Everest than have made the swim between England and France.

As McGlynn sets out to train for the swim (scheduled for 2026), he plunges into the history, logistics, and science of channel swimming. He takes his readers on a swift-moving, far-flung adventure, from the sunny waters of the Sea of Cortez to Harvard Medical School and extreme environments labs in England; from a four-day, 40-mile swim in the reservoirs of Arizona's Salt River, to an infamous nine-day training camp in Ireland. Along the way, he swims with the best open-water swimmers in the world, joining world-record holder Sarah Thomas in the not-quite-thawed mountain lakes of Colorado and traveling to Italy for the Ice Swimming World Championships, where competitors race in a "pool" chainsawed into a frozen lake. In the final climactic chapters, having logged thousands of miles in the pool, lakes, and ocean, he journeys to Dover, England to take his shot at the famous swim.

A columnist for Swimmer Magazine, and a frequent contributor to such venues as Men's Health, The New York Times, and Washington Post, David McGlynn has been writing about swimming for much of his career. While books about endurance sports—such as running and cycling—are increasingly popular, few writers have the chops to plunge into an undertaking quite like swimming the English Channel. But David does.


