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


NEW PRIZE FOR THESE EYES The Rise of America's Second Civil Rights Movement

More than a century of civil rights activism reached a mountaintop with the arrival of a Black man in the Oval Office. But hopes for a unified, post-racial America were deflated when Barack Obama's presidency met with furious opposition. A white, right-wing backlash was brewing, and a volcanic new movement—a second civil rights movement—began to erupt.

In *New Prize for These Eyes*, award-winning author Juan Williams shines a light on this historic, new movement. Who are its heroes? Where is it headed? What fires, furies, and frustrations distinguish it from its predecessor?

Juan Williams is a prizewinning journalist and historian. He is the author of the bestselling civil rights history *Eyes on the Prize: America's Civil Rights Years 1954–1965*, which accompanied the PBS series of the same name. He also wrote the landmark biography of the first African American on the Supreme Court, *Thurgood Marshall: American Revolutionary*, as well as *The New York Times* bestsellers *Enough* and *Muzzled: The Assault on Honest Debate*. He has written for *The New York Times*, *The Wall Street Journal, The New Yorker, The Atlantic, and Ebony*. He is currently senior political analyst for Fox News Channel and a columnist for The Hill.



CALLING IN How to Start Making Change with Those You'd Rather Cancel



From a pioneering Black feminist and MacArthur "Genius" Fellow, an urgent and exhilarating memoir-manifesto-handbook about how to rein in the excesses of cancel culture so we can truly communicate and solve problems together.

In 1979, Loretta Ross was a single mother who'd had to drop out of Howard University. She was working at Washington, DC's Rape Crisis Center when she got a letter from a man in prison saying he wanted to learn how to not be a rapist anymore. At first, she was furious. As a survivor of sexual violence, she wanted to write back pouring out her rage. But instead, she made a different choice, a choice to reject the response her trauma was pushing her towards, a choice that set her on the path towards developing a philosophy that would come to guide her whole career: rather than calling people out, try to call even your unlikeliest allies *in*. Hold them accountable—but do so with love.

Calling In is at once a handbook, a manifesto, and a memoir—because the power of Loretta Ross's message comes from who she is and what she's lived through. She's a Black woman who's deprogrammed white supremacists, a survivor who's taught convicted rapists the principles of feminism. With stories from her five remarkable decades in activism, she vividly illustrates why calling people *in*—inviting them into conversation instead of conflict by focusing on your shared values over a desire for punishment—is the more strategic choice if you want to make real change. And she shows you how to do so, whether in the workplace, on a college campus, or in your living room.

Loretta J. Ross is an activist, professor, and public intellectual. In her five decades in the human rights movement, she's deprogramed white supremacists, taught convicted rapists the principles of feminism, and organized the second-largest march on Washington (surpassed only by the 2017 Women's March). Her many accolades and honors include a 2022 MacArthur Fellowship and a 2024 induction into the National Women's Hall of Fame.







THEATER KID A Broadway Memoir



Before he was producing the musical hits of our generation, Jeffrey was just a kid coming to terms with his adoption, trying to understand his sexuality, and determined to escape his dysfunctional household in a poor neighborhood just outside Detroit. We see him find his voice through musical theater and move to New York, where he is determined to shed his past and make a name for himself on Broadway.

But moving to the big city is never easy—especially not at the height of the HIV/AIDS crisis and Jeffrey learns to survive and thrive in the colorful and cutthroat world of commercial theatre. From his early days as an office assistant, to meeting Jonathan Larson and experiencing the triumph and tragedy of *Rent*, to working with Lin-Manuel Miranda *on In the Heights* and *Hamilton*, Jeffrey completely pulls back the curtain on the joyous and gutwrenching process of making new musicals, finding new audiences, and winning a Tony Award—all the while finding himself.

Told with Jeffrey's candid and captivating voice, *Theater Kid* is a gripping memoir about fighting through a hardscrabble childhood to make art on one's own terms, chasing a dream against many odds, and finding acceptance and community.

Jeffrey is the mastermind behind musical megahits including *Rent, Avenue Q, In the Heights,* and *Hamilton*. His shows have garnered 22 Tony awards among them, including four for Best Musical, and he is the only producer ever to have made two Pulitzer Prize-winning musicals (*Rent* and *Hamilton*).



WHO KNEW

Barry Diller, one of America's most successful businessmen, reveals himself here—his successes, failures, and struggles—with surprising candor and intimacy in a memoir rich in Hollywood lore and filled with business acumen.

"I want to work in the mail room at William Morris." So begins Diller's show business life. Diller did not aspire to be an agent, nor was he a glove fit for William Morris, the legendary talent agency he describes as resembling a "Jewish Vatican." But he was a good assistant and student and took it all in.

Before long, Diller was offered a job at ABC. His ascent was meteoric, launching ABC TV's Movie of the Week at age twenty-seven, becoming CEO of Paramount Pictures at age thirty-two, and launching the Fox TV network at age forty-four. Along the way, Diller oversaw the production of classic films such as *Saturday Night Fever*, *Raiders of the Lost Ark*, and Home Alone (a film he credits with saving Rupert Murdoch's career) and hit TV shows such as *The Simpsons*, *Married...with Children*, and *Cops*.

Diller's media savvy changed the course of American culture. His championing of Alex Haley's Roots put long-form miniseries on the map. He was never cowed by the talent—actors, directors, and producers—and worked with them all. Moving beyond business, Diller recounts his family life, personal struggles, and regrets, his joyful marriage to Diane von Furstenburg, and where he has found fulfillment.

Intimate, candid, and moving, *Who Knew* is a different kind of business memoir, one that holds nothing back.





While struggling to find success as an actor and pay the bills, something accidentally happened to Jeff Hiller: he aged. And while it's one thing to get older and rest on the laurels of success from the blood, sweat, and tears of your youth, it's quite another to be old and have no laurels. At forty, stuck in a temp job making spreadsheets, the dream of becoming a star seemed out of reach. But after twenty-five years of guest roles on TV and performing improv in a grocery store basement, he finally struck gold with a breakout role on HBO's *Somebody Somewhere*, playing Joel—the kind of best friend everyone wishes they had.

In his book, Jeff dives into the grit and grind of climbing the Hollywood ladder. 





WE ARE EATING THE EARTH The Race to Fix Our Food System and Save Our Climate



In this rollicking, shocking narrative, Grunwald shows how the world, after decades of ignoring the climate problem at the center of our plates, has pivoted to making it worse, embracing solutions that sound sustainable but could make it even harder to grow more food with less land. 

Steve Grant was laid off in March of 2020. He was fifty and had cancer, so he needed health insurance, fast. Which is how he found himself a rural letter carrier in Appalachia, back in his old hometown.

Suddenly, he was the guy with the goods, delivering dog food and respirators and lube and heirloom tomato seeds and *Lord of the Rings* replica swords. He transported chicken feed to grandmothers living alone in the mountains and forded a creek with a refrigerator on his back. As the pandemic worsened, he became a lifeline for lonely people – a fleeting moment of human contact and an assurance that our government still cared.

A brash and loving portrait of an all-American institution, *Mailman* offers a deeply felt portrait of both rural America and the dedicated (and eccentric) letter carriers who keep our lives running smoothly day to day. Steve Grant has written an irreverent, heartfelt, and often hilarious tribute to the simple heroism of daily service, the dignity and struggle of blue-collar work, the challenge and pleasure of coming home again after twenty-five years away, and the delight of going the extra mile for your neighbors, every day.


Lee Tilghman—also known as @LeeFromAmerica—was one of the first wellness influencers. To her nearly 400,000 followers, she posted about skin care routines, sleep hacks, smoothie bowls, travel tips, and other rituals of #SelfCare. Her sponsorships with such brands as Madewell and Subaru netted an income of over \$300,000 a year. On the grid, her life seemed perfect.

But behind her carefully curated posts, Tilghman was in crisis, suffocating from the unrelenting demand of keeping up her online facade. The more she shared, the more her followers craved. Her romantic relationships suffered from the pressure to "hard launch." Her job's focus on food led her to develop orthorexia: an unhealthy obsession with eating "perfectly." After a stay in a mental health facility to address her disordered eating and psychological decline, Tilghman quit influencing as her primary career and set out to discover who she really was.

If You Don't Like This I Will Die is a bold critique of the influencer economy while also a relatable story for anyone who has struggled with the unreasonableness of online expectations.

Lee Tilghman began blogging when she was eighteen, amassing a large following for her blogs For the *Love of Peanut Butter* and *Lee From America*.

As a lark, he asked his parents if they would take him, and was stunned when they said yes. He was even more shocked when his mother, looking for information about how to get tickets, began a correspondence with Osbourne's secretary, who scored the family VIP passes and introduced them to Osbourne in Brazil. Thus began a friendship with Ozzy, his wife Sharon and the rest of the Osbourne family that has continued for decades.

Ozzy gifted Stephen a pair of fancy leather notebooks and told him to keep a record of their adventures and conversations. The result is *Ozzy & Me*: a beautiful behind-the-scenes memoir that proves the life-affirming, soul-nourishing power of music—and disproves the notion that you should never meet your heroes.



LUIGI The Making and The Meaning

The first book to explain why the world was primed for the Luigi Mangione moment, showing the history that led him to be embraced as an avenger with an affection not seen since Jesse James or Robin Hood.

The explosion of glee and sympathy for Luigi surprised everyone, but it was everywhere. Hours after the shooting of the United Healthcare executive, his company put out a message out on Facebook saying their "hearts go out to Brian's family and all who were close to him." People replied with laughing emojis and comments like this one: "No one here is the judge of who deserves to live or die. That's the job of the AI algorithm the insurance company designed to maximize profits on your health."

When he was arrested, TikTok exploded with more love for Luigi: "They could've been more gentle with him, he has back problems," said one commentator. Others attempted to come to his rescue. "He is innocent, he was with me the whole time."

So where is all this coming from? Richardson has tracked the building blocks of this widespread alienation for three decades, finding it across not only the environmental movement but among those who reject capitalism itself, including the rules that govern everything from insurance to healthcare. He has followed the men and women who have gone to extremes to express that alienation, and studied the inspirations they found in other outlaws, most especially Ted Kaczynski (Luigi had posted a review of Kaczynski's manifesto on Goodreads). The result is a book that will put Luigi in context and even illuminate how his appeal is likely to play out in the future.

As much as there has been written about creativity, there is still a big unknown about what happens when we actually come up with a good idea. This book demystifies that process and in so doing, offers a bold new perspective about where ideas come from, and how we can better arrive at them

We're used to thinking about creativity as a private lightbulb moment: a switch flips, a spark ignites, an epiphany happens. An idea which didn't exist before, suddenly does. But new findings in cognitive science and adjacent fields, show that creativity is in fact, a remarkably orderly process—one that has more in common with the rigorous, systematic steps that define the scientific method. The process that gives rise to transformative ideas in any realm—the arts, sciences, industry—looks a lot more like discovery than it does creation. In other words, arriving at a great idea is more like plugging into an external power grid than having a private lightbulb moment.

By making these implicit rules explicit, *Digging for Fire* turns conventional wisdom about creativity inside-out, shifting the spotlight from our latent inner "genius" to a much more attainable knack for navigating the conceptual landscapes all around us. Like the intrepid archeologist who depends on both meticulous excavation and a well-honed sense for where to look, we'll come to see that arriving at great ideas is not a natural gift bestowed on us at birth.

Instead, the creative process is an adventure of ideas. But like most great adventures, it requires a method and a map.



Not all impulses are destructive of course. The book uses modern neuroscience and psychology to show how the brain processes impulses. 

The story of 982 Holocaust refugees who were hand-selected for America's only World War 2 refugee camp.

In the summer of 1944, 982 men, women, and children—mostly Jewish, ragged from years of running, some still wearing the striped uniform of the concentration camps—arrived in Oswego, NY. For the next 500 days, these refugees--"guests" of Roosevelt's newly created War Refugee Board, struggle to assimilate to their new home behind a barbed wire fence, to grapple with the trauma rapidly catching up with them, and to contend with their unknown legal status. They deal with the drama of everyday life: menial work, romance, conflict with each other and their neighbors. Fourteen people lose their lives and twenty-three people are born, triggering a bureaucratic panic in Washington as Justice Department lawyers argue about whether the 14th amendment applied.

Ultimately, there's a happy ending for the refugees. Though they are told they'd have to return to Europe where their families were murdered, they advocate for themselves to become American citizens, and the government grants their request. They are helped by Eleanor Roosevelt, W.E.B. Du Bois, and Albert Einstein, who all lobby for their cause. They find unlikely allies in the local townspeople—blue-collar immigrants themselves who come to love their new neighbors. The refugees and their descendants go on to do great things: contribute artwork to the Met, become a co-owner of Zabar's, and help to develop the Cat scan and MRI, among other accomplishments.

Dr. Erbelding is the most accomplished historian in America on the subject of U.S. responses to the Holocaust. Her first book, RESCUE BOARD (Doubleday, 2018), won the National Jewish Book Award.


Using a non-linear narrative, Close Relationships with Strangers is propulsive and darkly humorous.
