Maya and Natasha are twin sisters born in the midst of the Siege of Leningrad in 1941 and immediately abandoned by their mother, a prima ballerina at the Kirov Ballet who would rather die than not dance. Taken in by their mother's best friend at the Kirov, the girls are raised to be dancers themselves. The Vaganova Ballet Academy—and the totalitarian Soviet regime—is the only world they know.

In 1958, now seniors at the Vaganova at the height of the Cold War, all Maya and Natasha and their classmates want is to dance with the Kirov, and to join the company on its tour to America next year. But a new law from the Kremlin upends Maya and Natasha's lives: due to fears of defection, family members may no longer travel abroad together. The Kirov can only accept one of them.

Maya, long accustomed to living in her sister's shadow, accepts her bitter fate, until a new dance partner inspires her to dream bigger and practice harder. For the first time—and at the cruelest possible moment—the sisters are equally matched. And then one sister betrays the other, altering their lives forever and splitting them in two, though neither will stray far from the other's orbit.

As one of the twins pursues her ballet career and experiences a world outside Russia for the first time, the other is cast in an epic film adaptation of *War and Peace*, produced and financed by the Soviet State. In 19th century Bulgaria, Yana is an unconventional kind of helper. She travels from one desolate town to the next, staging grisly tableaus while the villagers sleep: animal corpses in the public square, eggs filled with blood in the chicken coop. She tells the stricken villagers stories of monsters that stalk the night, vampires that only she can vanquish. The people stop fearing each other, and start to fear the monster. Then Yana eliminates the threat, and leaves seeds of hope in her wake.

But the village Koprivici thinks itself cursed, plagued by illness and dark fortune, with children who rarely survive infancy. There, Yana meets Anka: an isolated, headstrong orphan who the villagers blame for their misfortune, since their troubles began the night she was born. The village Captain has raised her, along with his nephew Kiril, but now they're nearly grown—Kiril a fledging doctor, determined to prove that science can help; Anka a strange adolescent, creeping closer to womanhood. The Captain is grooming her for matrimony and she's powerless against him—until Yana arrives. Together, the orphan and the vampire slayer hatch an urgent plan: to conjure a monster so vile, he might provide cover for Anka to escape. And then their plan takes on a life of its own.

With nods to Lauren Groff and Rivka Galchen, Anna Kovatcheva was equally inspired by Bulgarian folklore and *Buffy the Vampire Slayer*. This is a book about power struggles and violence, but also about agency, friendship, and the work of communal healing.

Social horror meets the vast and haunting landscape of Antarctica in this sharp-elbowed novel about a Black location scout on a holiday cruise at the bottom of the world, who ends up as one of the survivors of an ill-fated kayaking excursion. The remaining group becomes stranded on a remote island and must battle both the hostile landscape and their inner demons

Striker is not entirely sure that she should be on this luxury Antarctic cruise. She's a 40-year-old Black location scout, and her mission is to photograph potential film locations for a big-budget film while enjoying the fancy accommodations, the excursions, and the quirks of a small group of rich people who have decided to explore one of the last wild places on earth. While out kayaking on the Southern Ocean, a horrific accident occurs, leaving several of the kayakers dead and the survivors stranded without a guide on a remote island along the Antarctic Peninsula. The survivors include staff from the ship as well as the wealthy tourists, though the group is predominantly white except for Striker.

An abandoned cabin, mysterious rock formations, a missing child; none of these frighten Striker as much as the visions that threaten to unravel her sanity in this hostile place. As their party dwindles and the earth seems to reject them soul by soul, survival becomes something that inspires fear as much as desire.

Leave the World Behind meets The Ministry of Time, THE UNVEILING is a work that neither comforts nor offers closure as the icy vastness of the Antarctic region reflects the characters' inner ghosts back to them. Quan Barry's canvas is as vast as the Antarctic itself, and yet she's able to create a very specific fever dream that is at its root about the existence of Blackness in white spaces.

She has a habit of recording people without their knowledge, just to hear the world reflected back at her. Olive is approaching her midthirties, coddled by her mother and perpetually single, when she meets Henry. He's a surgeon—he literally cuts people open, which fascinates her—and, with a quick wit and a charming gap between his two front teeth, he seems to adore her. Henry relishes her curious mind, upending everything she's come to expect from men.

They fall for each other quickly, dizzyingly, but Olive can't get enough. She struggles to comprehend where she stops and Henry begins. Ceridwen Morris has been a labor doula and childbirth educator for 20 years, working with thousands of expectant parents in New York City, and this book is what her clients and students have been looking for—and asking her to write—for years (one of them, New Yorker staff writer Alexandra Schwartz, said a book based on her childbirth class would be "revolutionary").

HOW TO GIVE BIRTH is not about pregnancy or what comes after the baby is born, but the pivotal birth experience in between. It takes readers step by step through the fascinating bodily science of labor; the myriad procedures and tools of the hospital; and the tried-and-true strategies and techniques for coping with all that may come up during birth. Ceridwen dismantles the opposition in the "natural" vs medical birth debate and pushes against the trend toward birth horror. The book is intimate and story-driven, woven with accounts from her career as a doula, but always practical. It is also universal: Ceridwen was raised in the UK and has also spent time in the birthing communities in Australia. Her wisdom and advice is aimed at an audience anywhere in the world, not just those navigating the US healthcare system.

HOW TO GIVE BIRTH demystifies, clarifies, and takes the knowable unknowns out of labor and delivery. It is as attentive to the physical, mammalian experience of the laboring body as it is to the tech, the medicine, and the hospital institution. It makes room for the psychological, emotional, even spiritual aspects of birth but it is completely grounded in science and best medical evidence. It combines the practicality and research of classics like Heidi Murkoff's What to Expect When You're Expecting, Michel Odent's The Nature of Birth and Breastfeeding, and the more recent Emily Oster's Expecting Better, and the philosophy of Oliver Burkeman's Four Thousand Weeks (a comparison made by FSG), with an emotional sincerity and lyricality that makes it a pleasure, and a relief, to be in Ceridwen's assured company on the page.

Pre-empted in a significant deal in the US and before it had even gone out on official submission in the UK, this is truly one of our favorite projects to talk about, a stunning work of narrative nonfiction that has space, science, and love, and will stretch your mind as profoundly as it stirs your heart. Also delivering in early 2025

15 billion miles away, in the cold vacuum beyond the edge of the solar system, a human heart waits to beat again. It is suspended in gold and copper, a groove in a phonographic record that is bolted to the side of NASA's Voyager I satellite probe. It is the heartbeat of a young writer named Ann Druyan, who recorded it, along with her brainwaves, during an hour spent reflecting on the history of the Earth and on the experience of having just fallen in love, on a summer's day in 1977. Launched into space a few months later, Druyan's heartbeat is a track on the famous Golden Record: a compilation of Earth recordings assembled on the infinitesimal chance that alien intelligence might intercept the Voyager as it wanders through space.

This heartbeat, this pulsewave, is an interstellar message about humanity—what does it say about us? What does it convey about human life? This book tackles this question: not by attempting to predict some remote scene of unlikely alien decipherment, but by asking what the message—in the very form of its impulse to connect with others—can tell us about ourselves. THE HEARTBEAT AT THE EDGE OF THE SOLAR SYSTEM tells a spellbinding story of human emotional technology in which the search for knowledge and the search for intimacy are inseparably entwined.

The chapters in this book weave the cinematic story of Ann Druyan as she conceives of and executes her track for the Golden Record (while secretly falling in love with the project's technical director, Carl Sagan) with the little-known history of physiological recording (from pulse-reading to cardiographs to EEGs). And it traces the intergalactic paths of the Voyagers—pulsewave readers of the cosmos—whose signals back to Earth are expected to flicker out within the next five years.





Matthew Specktor grew up in the film industry: the son of legendary CAA super-agent Fred Specktor, his childhood was one where Beau Bridges came over for dinner, Martin Sheen's daughter was his close friend, and Marlon Brando left long messages on the family answering machine. He would eventually spend time working in Hollywood himself, first as a reluctant studio executive and later as a screenwriter.

Now, with THE GOLDEN HOUR, Specktor blends memoir, cultural criticism, and narrative history to tell the story of the modern motion picture industry—illuminating the conflict between art and business that has played out over the last 75 years in Hollywood. At once a book about the movie business and an intimate family drama, THE GOLDEN HOUR is a sweeping portrait of the American Century.



Sitting in a circle at Sibley Memorial Hospital in Washington, D.C., 35-year-old writer Ted Scheinman remembered why he was there. He had checked himself into the psychiatric ward after months of worsening, eventually paralytic depression to undergo an aggressive course of electroconvulsive therapy (ECT)-more colloquially known as "shock treatment." Before turning to ECT as a last resort, Ted had submitted himself, without relief, to nearly every form of psychiatry: prescriptions for every SSRI and SSNI on the market, ketamine infusions, cognitive behavioral therapy, psychodynamic therapy, mindfulness-based therapy. But now, buzzing from his first zap in the ECT chair, he recollected little of all that—not even what he'd had for breakfast that morning. He couldn't remember the names of the fellow sufferers with whom he was now playing slapjack, or the phone call last night to his mom. All he had were the notes he'd written in his journal or had scrawled on construction paper during art therapy.

That's one of the things the electricity can do to you before snapping you back to life.

Ted's account of his descent into and emergence from major depression—and the accompanying memory loss—is the canvas for a broader investigation into the history and effectiveness of ECT, the links between memory and depression, and how our memories make us who we are. Despite Ted's great loss, his amnesia—a rare severe case—ultimately proves a small price to pay for the new shot at life offered by electroconvulsive therapy.

JOLT is a beautiful, funny, philosophical and ultimately hopeful memoir, which also raises big questions about memory, mental health, and the treatment of depression. It is for readers of books like Rachel Aviv's *Strangers to Ourselves*, Robert Kolker's *Hidden Valley Road*, and Susannah Calahan's *Brain on Fire*.

I HAVE THIS THING FOR FLOWERS opens with a broken engagement: on April Fool's Day, Sawchyn arrives home from a conference to find her fiancé packing his bags and calling off their wedding. Six months later, both in need of health insurance, Sawchyn and her good friend Sarah arrive at City Hall, entering into a marriage of practicality that will later grow to one of love. Through wide-ranging research on everything from the seedlings in her own backyard to the far-flung flora of Monet's Giverny, Sawchyn employs the physical presentations, scientific and medicinal uses, folkloric myths and resonances, and colonialist histories of flowers to trace the winding path that led her to the home and garden she shares with her now-wife.

Each chapter of FLOWERS takes one floral genus and pairs it with a moniker (i.e., "Achillea | The Addict") to link that flower's characteristics to Alysia's relationship with the chapter's human subject, drawing on disciplines like botany, painting, herbalism, literature, history, photography, popular culture, and more. Each self-contained segment of this "herbarium" acts in service of the larger narrative, delving into the multivalences of queer marriage, the complexities of addiction and recovery, what it means to be a neighbor in an unknown town, and how diaspora manifests itself biologically, in both humans and plants.

With echoes of Robin Wall Kimmerer's *Braiding Sweetgrass*, Sawchyn's work encourages us to forge deep emotional connections with the nature around us to better understand our world and the people who most intimately shape our lives.

What was that game we used to play when we were children? We played it every night, before things went wrong between us.

It was a story game, wasn't it?

In the humid dark of a eucalyptus-scented room, a woman named Hui lies on a mattress telling stories about herself to her listener, a little girl. She talks about her identity as the child of an immigrant, her feelings about being in a mixed-race marriage, her opinions on mental health. But as the stories progress, it becomes clear that a volatile secret is lurking beneath their surface. There are events in Hui's past that have great significance for the person she's become, but that have gone missing from her memory. What is it, exactly, that is haunting Hui? And just as importantly—what is the room that Hui is lying in? Who is the little girl she keeps talking to? And who, actually, is Hui herself?

As the conversation continues, what unfolds is a breathtaking and unexpected journey through layers of story toward truth and recovered identity; a memoir that reenacts, in tautly novelistic fashion, the process of healing that author Shze-Hui Tjoa moved through in order to recover memories lost to complex-PTSD and to, eventually, reconstruct her sense of self. 
Everyone says the early days of parenting go so fast, but 1 a.m. is molasses; it's middle-of-the-night math calculating the hours until the next bedtime. Then a first family road trip, fourmonth-old in tow, narrowly avoids disaster, and those slow hours, in all their abundance, suddenly feel like a gift. At 7 a.m., a six-year-old offers a stuck poet one perfect phrase, giftwrapped in a question: "How do you spell 'clouds folded over them'?" Noon is animal rage, because a parent can no more protect their child from an active shooter alert on campus than from a bee sting, and wearing that rage is sometimes the only thing to do. And for the hour that turns the page on a new day. a tender realization that this is the house where these children will grow up, are already growing up—a realization set against a loud soundtrack of animal voices saying something urgent but unknowable. In FOXES FOR EVERYBODY, Catherine Pierce reaches through that cloud of anxiety that permeates our everyday and pulls back a little bit of sunshine from the beyond. It's 24 lessons in how to pay better attention-to our families, to our environment, and to those sneaky little moments that just might reshape your mind, if you let them.

Catherine Pierce is the Poet Laureate of Mississippi and the author of four books of poems: Danger Days (2020), The Tornado Is the World (2016), The Girls of Peculiar (2012), and Famous Last Words (2008), all from Saturnalia Books. UNCANNY VALLEY GIRLS by poet and artist Zefyr Lisowski is a memoir-in-essays that overflows with moments of queer joy, disability justice, and trans kinship, and spans a life from a trans childhood in the depths of the Great Dismal Swamp to an adult stay in a locked psychiatric unit in New York City. It is a story about horror and love and loss and care

Lisowski asks: what does it mean to build a life when the only reflection you see is in things that hate you? She found a path to answering that question through horror movies, used to understand not just a life filled with violence, but the necessity of love and care as well. Indeed, Lisowski argues that scary movies—a genre where she first felt seen as a disabled trans woman—can be a way to express love too.

In these wide-ranging essays, Lisowski incorporates nuanced critiques of movies spanning from *The Ring* to *The Wolf-Man*. In "The Girl, The Well, The Ring," she examines society's fears about sickness and disability, twined with her own history of sickness and the coded moral messaging she learned from movies like *The Ring* and *Pet Semetary*. The titular essay, "Uncanny Valley Girls," uses *Scream* as a lens to reflect on Lisowski's dream of escaping her hometown in the rural South for California in the early 2000s, only to re-inspect what she was escaping in the first place.

Examining moments of stillness and love in otherwise intense movies to understand similar moments of care in a trauma-filled life, UNCANNY VALLEY GIRLS uses these extreme movies to emphasize the importance of building community even when further hurt is guaranteed. Affirming without being anodyne, the collection is written for horror fans, queers finding themselves, and spooky girls everywhere.




