

Part What We Talk About When We Talk About Race, part The Tipping Point, part Freakonomics, this timely book, about the urgent and unseen ways that race affects the economy, will change the way we look at the world around us.

In a decade at NPR (National Public Radio), Sonari Glinton was often the only Black reporter in the room. During that time, as he traveled the country covering the U.S. economy and the people who made it go round, he came to recognize an alarming and insistent gap between the way the economy was portrayed by mainstream institutions and the way that Americans actually experienced it. It turns out, race has been entirely avoided in our understanding of the economy, but Glinton argues race touches every aspect of our economy every day in surprising but unmistakable ways.

BLACKENOMICS seeks to tell the real story of the American economy through the prism of race. Balancing economics, pop culture, and narrative, Glinton uses everything from the film industry to traffic to advertising to Rihanna to Wall Street to highlight how race has shaped the economy and how much opportunity lies in this understanding because when everyone is included in the economy, everyone wins.

Sonari Glinton is known and adored by millions for his lively storytelling and counterintuitive insights. He has spent his career covering business, culture and politics. With his pioneering work covering business for NPR, Glinton has often been the only Black man reporting on major news events. In 2004, Glinton co-created one of the first and longest running daily news podcasts, *The Rundown*. Glinton has produced, hosted, and contributed to the most prestigious audio shows in modern history: *Planet Money, This American Life, CodeSwitch, All Things Considered, Out Magazine, Fresh Air*, and *American Routes*, and his work has appeared on The BBC, *The New York Times* and *Slate*.

In this definitive book on revenge, a Yale psychiatry researcher exposes the unseen neurobiological cause of violence—a compulsive desire for retribution—and offers a profound new understanding of human behavior and breakthrough framework for making our lives and communities safer.

There is a hidden addiction plaguing humankind right now: revenge. Researchers have identified retaliation in response to real and imagined grievances as the root cause of most forms of human aggression and violence. From vicious tweets to road rage, murder-suicide, and armed insurrection, perpetrators almost always see themselves as victims seeking justice. Chillingly, recent neuroimaging studies of the human brain show that harboring a personal grievance activates the neural pleasure and reward circuitry of *addiction*. Although this behavior is ancient and seems inevitable, by understanding retaliation and violence as an addictive brain-biological process, we can control deadly revenge cravings and save lives. In *THE SCIENCE OF REVENGE*, Yale violence researcher and psychiatry lecturer James Kimmel, Jr., JD, uncovers the truth behind why we want to hurt the people who hurt us, what happens when it gets out of hand, and how to stop it.

Weaving neuroscience, psychology, sociology, law, and human history with captivating storytelling, Dr. Kimmel reveals the neurological mechanisms and prevalence of revenge addiction. James Kimmel, Jr. has received international media attention for developing the first website for preventing murders and mass shootings, which uses a suicide prevention approach to provide individuals contemplating homicide with resources and support. He is a founder and co-director of the Yale Collaborative for Motive Control Studies, which researches and develops public health methods to prevent and treat justice-addiction and violence. A debut novel by a Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist inspired by his family history as a descendent of Cherokee Freedmen, illuminating a largely untold chapter in American history where the Cherokee Nation enslaved Black Americans on their journey west on the Trail of Tears.

In 2007, Cherokee Nation held a referendum and voted overwhelmingly to exclude its descendants known as Cherokee Freedmen—African Americans who, for decades leading up to the Civil War, had been enslaved by the tribe at the encouragement of the US government. Most people do not even realize that Native American tribes held slaves.

In ON LIGHTNING, Cooper unfurls a sweeping yet intimate story of the Manleys and the Ragsdales, two Black families whose stories converge with a birth in 1880. Across nine states and eight decades, the story charts the course of these families who lived, worked, loved and lost as on-again, off-again members of the Cherokee Nation, sometimes as slaves, sometimes as equals—as U.S. and Cherokee laws shape shifted their way through history. A gripping narrative that takes the story of slavery out of the deep south and into the west — Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Nevada, and illuminates serial separations of relatives, the dehumanizing effects of the tribe's racial hierarchy, and the shocks of frontier-style violence.

Drawing on exhaustive archival research, oral histories, and ancestral detective work, *ON LIGHTNING* presents a new portrait of slavery in the American West, set against the backdrop of monumental events in Cherokee history, as never seen before.

Kenneth J. Cooper is a Pulitzer-Prize winning journalist who spent the last twenty years researching his family's history. In his four decades in journalism, he has been a reporter in newsrooms at the *Washington Post* and the *Boston Globe*, and most recently as an editor at GBH News, the Boston NPR station. His work has exposed racial inequity in Boston and all over the world, and he has penned numerous opinion pieces and articles about the Cherokee Freedmen. As of 2019, Cooper is enrolled as a citizen of the Cherokee Nation.

On a lonely Christmas Eve, Zarina makes a GIF for Wrestle Thunder Ground superstar Sierra Myst after she secures a big victory. It's a simple gesture, but one that pulls Zarina into Sierra's inner circle and the limelight of wrestling fandom. Suddenly, Zarina is being recognized at events and integrated into the fabric of Sierra's daily, real life.

On paper, the two couldn't be more unlikely as friends: Sierra is world-famous, growing up with money and traditionally good looks; Zarina is an immigrant toiling away in the kitchen of a fancy restaurant as an underpaid prep cook. But both come from families they can't connect to and have had to make their own way in their chosen careers, often finding themselves isolated by the pursuit of their passions. For Zarina, the closeness to Sierra satiates a hunger for family. When Zarina makes plans to start her own restaurant, she looks to Sierra for help in realizing her dream. But not everything is golden in the glow of celebrity. In light of a cheating scandal (that Zarina spills the beans about) and questions about whether BIPOC wrestlers are allowed to win in the fabricated world of wrestling, Sierra's privilege slides into callousness. Suddenly, Zarina finds herself on the opposing side from Sierra and begins to wonder if Sierra has ever known her at all. How much can Zarina stomach before she says *enough?*

APPETITE investigates the insidious nature of having heroes. It explores our current reality of online platforms blurring the line between public and private, the loneliness of young professional life, fandom that both uplifts and destroys, and chosen family that doesn't overwrite the hope that your parents will understand you one day. This is an immersive novel that combines the warmth of food writing and the cold reality of celebrity.



In the summer of 1909, a 23-year old infantryman named Henry "Hap" (for "Happy") Arnold was wandering through Paris in his American Army uniform when he came across a strange contraption suspended over the macadam. It looked like a machine from the future—mechanical yet lifelike. This was the dawn of the machine age and most people had yet to witness even a motorcar, let alone an airplane. Only in retrospect, years later, could he understand this moment of destiny. 

For the better part of the past century, two families have captured the public's imagination: the British royals and the closest thing the U.S. has to royalty, the Kennedy clan. Much ink has been spilled on these two cultural and political dynasties, but no one has ever thoughtfully examined them side by side. Royals expert Caroline Hallemann aims to do just that—a project that becomes especially relevant in this moment, when questions about what role these dynasties play, and whether we need them anymore, loom large. Relying on deep archival research and original new interviews with individuals close to the story, Hallemann will tell an intimate and multi-generational tale of the relationship between the British royals and the Kennedys, offering previously untold accounts of the private connections, shared struggles, and public associations of two of the most famous families in modern history.

This is far more than a timeline of their connections: THE KENNEDYS AND THE WINDSORS reveals that these two families drew inspiration, and at times admonition, from one another in ways that shaped their images and legacies. From the Kennedys' first introduction to the British monarchy, a swirl of parties, pageants and meetings that put John F. Kennedy on the first rung to political office, to the moment Jackie and Elizabeth II found common ground as young mothers (and devoted horsewomen) bracing to raise children in the public eye, to the helpless agony JFK Jr. felt when Princess Diana was felled by the paparazzi and young William and Harry grieved, like he did, in front of the world. There are the spares, Princess Margaret and Lee Radziwill, with scandal clipping at their heels, and how the family engines churned to protect them. Even the fashion inspirations—Jackie to Diana, Carolyn Bessette to Meghan Markle—and shared passions for service—such as William's recent Earthshot Prize, inspired by JFK decades before—connect these families across an ocean and throughout time.

Caroline Hallemann is the Digital Director of *Town & Country* magazine, where she writes about culture, society, and the world of the rich and powerful. Her work has been featured in *People, Marie Claire, Glamour, Elle, Us Weekly*, and *Hello*, among many others. She has also been featured on BBC radio as a royals expert.



One of the last untold World War II stories, a harrowing true detective story that unearths the lives of the spies who cued the world-changing attack on Pearl Harbor.

FAMILY OF SPIES plunges readers into the throes of a rising Nazi party in Berlin in the years before WWII, the days of Third Reich parties and pageantry that hid a much more sinister truth. When Ruth, the eldest daughter of the Kuehn family, became the lover of none other than Nazi politician Joseph Goebbels, the Kuehns saw a way out of the hard times that had befallen them. That was, until Goebbels discovered Ruth was half-Jewish. Rather than having Ruth killed, Goebbels chose to send the entire Kuehn family—parents, Ruth, and her two younger brothers—to Hawaii. There, the Kuehns spied on Pearl Harbor and, using a signaling system of lights from the dormer window of their home overlooking the naval base, delivered clandestine information to the Japanese about the comings and goings of U.S. ships. Amidst the sugar cane farms and pineapple groves, they entertained extravagantly and curried favor with American officers, even as they maneuvered to evade an FBI agent on their tail. After Pearl Harbor, when the Kuehns were arrested for their role in the attack, the Keuhn's teenage son—the author's father—denounced his family and German heritage, enlisted in the U.S. Army, and went on to fight in the Battle of Okinawa.

One of the last truly untold stories of WWII, FAMILY OF SPIES is a complicated excavation of genealogical bombshells, a cautionary tale of a family destroyed by its own secrets, and a riveting true espionage thriller that sheds new light on the machinations behind the devastating attack on Pearl Harbor. Were the Kuehns cunning or clueless, greedy or gullible? The impossible answers to these questions have haunted their descendants in the decades since. Drawing on first-hand interviews and confessions, family correspondence, newspaper accounts, and thousands of pages of redacted FBI files, Christine Kuehn illuminates a fascinating and fraught chapter of WWII history, and reckons with her own family's long-hidden, stranger-than-fiction past.



The mystique of the Romanov dynasty and its tragic downfall has compelled readers for the last century and there is no more notorious, nefarious, and nebulous figure in that story than Grigory Rasputin, the "mad monk" who has long been accused of seducing the Romanovs into their demise. Many have come forward claiming to be part of this story, but every claim to this fascinating history has been proven false—except that of Maria Rasputin, the daughter of Grigory Rasputin. Her story is more fascinating, colorful and outrageous than anyone might dare claim, let alone believe. And yet it's true.

In THE MAD MONK'S DAUGHTER, Vanity Fair contributor and royals expert, Hadley Meares, will unspool the largely overlooked story of Maria Rasputin. Maria was born in Siberia and brought to St. Petersburg when she was thirteen to live with her father. There, she played with the Romanov princesses and became a favorite of the Empress Alexandra. When Maria discovered her father's murdered body, she was harbored by the royal family until the Empress urged her to escape. So began the many iterations of Maria Rasputin, who steadfastly defended her father's innocence and benevolence until she died. Maria became a wife, a cabaret dancer, a mother, and a lion tamer in the Ringling Brothers Circus at the height of circuses in America.

By focusing, for the first time, on Maria's point of view, THE MAD MONK'S DAUGHTER reveals a new side of the Romanovs and Rasputin, humanizing them, and chronicling the aftermath of the fall of Russia for so many who fled. It also captures the prismatic nature of celebrity in our culture, and how the stories we tell about ourselves are the riddles we leave for the world to understand.

Hadley Meares is a regular contributor to *Vanity Fair*, where she writes about Hollywood and the entertainment industry and is an expert on all things royal. Her work also appears in *The Hollywood Reporter, Airmail, Curbed LA, Los Angeles Magazine*, and more. She appears frequently on TV and radio to provide commentary about the royals. Grace Hoeman dreamed of standing on top of Denali. The tallest peak in North America, the fierce polar mountain loomed large in many climbers' imaginations, and Grace, a doctor in Alaska, had come close to the top, only to be turned back by altitude sickness and a storm that took the lives of seven fellow climbers in one remorseless blow. Other expeditions denied her a place because of her gender, and when a letter arrived from a climber in California named Arlene Blum, who'd only been invited on expeditions if she would stay at base camp and cook for the men, Grace got a defiant idea: she would organize and lead the first-ever all-female ascent of the frozen Alaskan peak.

Everyone told the "Denali Damsels," as the team called themselves, that it couldn't be done: women were incapable of climbing mountains on their own. Men had walked on the moon; women still had not stood on the highest points on Earth. But these six women were unwilling to be limited by misogynists. They pushed past barriers in society at large, the climbing world, and their own bodies. And then, when disaster struck at the worst time on their expedition, they could either keep their wits and prove their mettle, or die and confirm the worst opinions of men.

Journalist and outdoor adventurer, Cassidy Randall draws on extensive archival research and original interviews to tell the engrossing, edge-of-your-seat adventure story about this forgotten group of climbers who had the audacity to believe that women could walk alone in such extraordinary and treacherous heights. Randall also brings a new voice and perspective to the adventure category—also long the province of men.

Cassidy Randall is a freelance journalist experienced at telling narrative nonfiction stories about adventure and people expanding human potential. Her work has appeared in TIME, The New York Times, National Geographic, Rolling Stone, Men's Journal, and Outside, among others, and she's an adventure travel columnist on Forbes. THE AMERICAN SCHOOL OF SPIES tells the story of an American team of classicists who would infiltrate Greece as the Nazis began closing in to try to save its two most important commodities—its people and its antiquities. In 1942, as head of the newly formed agency, the OSS, Wild Bill Donovan deployed spies across Europe and around the world to try to thwart the Nazis. He had a unique idea for recruits to be sent to Greece—archaeologists. He tapped a swashbuckling young Ivy League-trained archeologist named Rodney Young to assemble and lead a team of the most unlikely of spies ("the Greek desk" they were called)—academics, classicists, epigraphers (specialists in translating inscriptions), numismatists (who studied ancient coins and money), Egyptologists, underwater specialists, and amphora experts versed in the long-necked Greek vases.

These spies, men and women, young and old, went undercover and tried desperately to protect some of the world's most significant treasures. They reburied artifacts. They created fakes to give over to the Nazis to appease their lust for these remarkable works. And ultimately when it became clear the cat and mouse game on its own wasn't going to save Athens (the Nazis at one point ordered that Athens be destroyed), they brought in an army of Greek American soldiers to beat back Nazi regime and save their homeland.

Drawing on newly declassified documents and never before published firsthand accounts in Greek, Talty will deliver a fascinating, character-driven, completely unexplored and untold narrative of an unlikely team of eccentric intellectuals who set out to save the world.

Stephan Talty is the *New York Times* Bestselling author of 11 acclaimed nonfiction books, as well as two crime novels, *Black Irish* and *Hangman*. He's written for the *New York Times Magazine*, *GQ*, *Playboy, the Chicago Review* and many others.



Howard Zinn (1922-2010) was known as "the people's historian." His seminal work, A People's History of the United States, is perhaps the most influential history book of the last 150 years. A child of Jewish immigrants, Zinn grew up in a tenement in depression-era Brooklyn, which helped form his unwavering belief in and respect for the working class. He was directly involved in some of the most significant movements of the second half of the 20th century: he participated in the Black Freedom Struggle as an on-the-ground historian of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee; he organized against the war in Vietnam and in favor of prison and criminal justice reform; he mentored luminary Black women activists such as Alice Walker; and he emerged as a vocal opponent to George W. Bush's wars in the Middle East. His remarkably prescient ideology helped establish the foundation for groundbreaking, nation-changing movements like the 1619 project and Black Lives Matter, and even speaks to the momentum currently building to organize Starbucks and Amazon.

In 2018 the Artys were a young Black family of five in search of a new house to call home on Long Island. Their real estate experiences up to that point had been frustrating and demeaning – realtors using all the tactics to steer them away from listings or neighborhoods that seemed desirable. It was a chance drive along the windy roads of Oyster Bay on Long Island's exclusive North Shore that led them to the house they would make their forever home. Only, at first, it was a crumbling structure with a real estate sign so old it was covered in vines.

THE CHANCELLOR'S MANSION tells the remarkable story of the Arty's quest to stake claim to the American dream—an updated, more inclusive version of it—as they say yes to the house and embark on a massive renovation and reclamation project with three small children in tow. They must reckon with a litany of reasons why this was a bad idea: room after room filled to the 12-foot-high ceiling with junk; water cascading from above when a tree falls into the roof; the omnipresent sense of their life savings literally being thrown out the window.

But the Artys also have moments of discovery and wonder. Secret passageways, gravestones on the property from the 1600s, and one-of-a-kind architectural details emerge from the wreckage, and ultimately Jamie unearths the previous owner's story: Thomas McCoun, a prominent judge and well-regarded figure, was not a slave owner (as had been common in that area of Long Island), but rather an abolitionist who emancipated a Black woman and paid her a proper salary to work for the family for decades. Perhaps this is the foundation on which the Artys can build something lasting after all—a house with a history they can be proud of and a future that is bright.


In January 2017, three families spent the weekend at a nearby backcountry ski cabin in Colorado, seeking quality time with their close friends and the chance to bond with their gaggle of teenagers by soaking up the expanse of glittering, pristine nature. But when two of the skiers decided to head out early one morning to ski a loop through the fresh powder on their own, they disappeared.

One, Brett Beasley, the father of two girls, was a U.S. Forest Ranger and legendary mountain man, the last person you would expect to get lost in the wild. The second was Cole Walters-Schaler, a scrawny 15-year-old boy who had recently lost his mother to cancer and was searching for solace in the great outdoors. The next 30 hours would prove to be the most harrowing this small mountain community had ever endured. A storm moved in swiftly, smothering the region in unprecedented snowfall, and a search was risky and ill-advised for even the most accomplished guides. Tension among the families grew ever thicker with resentment, blame, and fear. When the storm cleared less than two days later, only one person emerged from the mountains alive.

THE WAY OUT is a taut, riveting narrative of tragedy, survival, and the cost of living on nature's knife's edge. When Devon O'Neil heard about this story five years later, what struck him most was Cole, the boy who survived—and had never spoken to anyone about what happened out there. O'Neil himself regularly backcountry skis four days a week, leaving his two sons; naturally, then, this tragic story weaseled its way into his consciousness. Now the families and most notably Cole, the lone survivor of that fateful morning, have agreed to talk about their tragic experience for the first time.

In the tradition of *Into the Wild* and *Crazy for the Storm*, *THE WAY OUT* is a survival narrative that reverberates with larger human truths and moral questions: What is our contract with nature? What is our responsibility to loved ones when pursuing the thrill of high-risk adventures? Does that calculation shift when children are involved? When your way of living gets rattled to its core, how are you changed?



In 1960 an Eastern Airlines flight had no sooner lifted from the runway at Boston Logan Airport when it abruptly took a nose dive into the frigid waters of the Boston Harbor, killing 62 people. This was the nascent, golden age of commercial air flight, of luxury in the skies, and a bird strike – the suspected cause of the crash – was the last thing the airline industry needed. The FAA instructed the bird's remains to be sent to the Smithsonian Institution for examination. There, they would land on the desk of the only person in the world equipped to make sense of it all. Her name was Roxie Laybourne, a diminutive but singular woman with thick glasses and a passion for birds. Laybourne didn't know it at the time, but that dead bird marked the start of a remarkable scientific journey that would consume her life and change the course of aviation. She became the world's first forensic ornithologist.

The house in which John Wayne Gacy hid his victims' bodies has long been torn down. In its place, a single-family Tudor home. Beyond its well-manicured lawn, the town of Des Plaines tries to move on. Kim Byers-Lund has tried to move on, too, from the night at Nisson Pharmacy when she was the last person to see Rob Piest alive. Her testimony and a receipt left in the pocket of Rob's jacket were Gacy's undoing. And now, forty years later, she has brought her daughter Courtney to the place that was once home. Seeing her mother revisit the pharmacy, Rob's grave, and the river where they found Rob's body, a question takes hold in Courtney: How do these murders live on in the places where they happened, and in the people that they happened to?

POSTMORTEM will examine the aftershocks of Gacy's crimes in the town of Des Plaines and the larger world. Interwoven with the story of Kim's bravery in helping to solve the mystery of Gacy's identity, Courtney will explore the town in its current state, traveling back in the present day with a close friend of Rob's, as well immersing the reader in the unexpected communities of psychologists and fans devoted to the case. These threads interweave with one another, giving the reader an intimate and full picture.

Author Courtney Lund O'Neil, PhD, has written for *The New York Times, The Washington Post, Glamour, The Guardian, Oprah Daily*, and more. Her book will speak to readers who were captivated by *The Third Rainbow Girl* and *I'll Be Gone In the Dark*, those who are looking for nuanced storytelling that gives weight to the aftershocks of crimes on a community. As someone with unique access to the case, Courtney is the only one who can write *POSTMORTEM* with the empathy that comes from being inside this story.

Kim Byers-Lund is the first person to speak in the new hit Netflix docuseries *Conversations with a Killer: The John Wayne Gacy Tapes.* Her diary entries from that time frame the narrative in the series, and it is Courtney who is in possession of that diary now. The show debuted at number one, making it clear that people are still interested in this case specifically. *POSTMORTEM* will pick up where the docuseries leaves off.



In 2018, Poland's right-wing government passed a law mandating that any history of Polish involvement with the Nazis be obscured. It didn't take long (2021) for two scholars to be brought to trial for documenting the death of Jews at the hands of Poles in a small portion of a 1,200-page scholarly work. They were the Jews in the garden next door. And Judy and Sam want to tell their story. Judy Rakowsky is an award-winning reporter and editor for outlets including The Boston Globe, People Magazine, The Providence Journal, The Columbus Citizen-Journal, and The Plain Dealer. She has covered the major stories of our time, from organized crime and bank fraud litigation in Rhode Island in the 1980s to terrorism and security issues after 9/11 to online bullying in the 2000s. She is currently the Managing Director for Crisis and Strategic Communications at Liberty Square Group.





Rosie Schaap had a solid career as a journalist and a life that looked to others like nonstop fun: all drinking and dining and traveling to beautiful places—and getting paid to write about it. But under the surface she was reeling from the loss of her husband and her mother—who died just one year apart. Caring for them claimed much of her daily life in her late thirties. Mourning them would take longer.

It wasn't until a reporting trip took her to the Northern Irish countryside that Rosie found a partner to heal with: Glenarm, a quiet, seaside village in County Antrim. That first visit made such an impression she returned to make a life. This unlikely place—in a small, tough country mainly associated with sectarian strife—gave her a measure of peace that had seemed impossible elsewhere.

THE SLOW ROAD NORTH is a moving and wise look at how a community can offer the key to healing. It's a portrait of a complicated place at a pivotal time—through Brexit, a historic school integration, and a pandemic—and a love letter to a village, a culture, and a country. It blends personal narrative and social history. The Irish have always had an openness in the face of death and loss, and this book will explore that communal candor and its effects both on Rosie's psyche and Northern Ireland's own sociopolitical healing. By turns meditative and wry, this book is a vivid and insightful portrait of Rosie's new chosen home—what led her there, and what keeps her there.

This novel marks the end of our narrator's friendship with celebrated Puerto Rican author M. Domínguez. Their relationship—a gray space somewhere between father/daughter and romantic partners—was born out of a fan letter written in Tatum's undergrad dorm room, to a then-30-something Domínguez. She was drawn to his stories, with their mix of Spanish and English and their Latinx characters, who she recognized from real life but had never before seen immortalized in the literary canon. Tatum falls easily into Domínguez's grasp, moving to New York City to stay in his orbit as she tries to discern who she's meant to be. But when Domínguez fictionalizes their relationship for his own career gains, Tatum feels betrayed and cuts off contact. Years later, a journalist intent on exposing Domínguez's dark side prompts Tatum to break her silence. LIKE HAPPINESS is her account to Domínguez of their story, a reckoning with gender and ambition within Latinx politics, and a dazzling reclamation of her agency. LIKE HAPPINESS is for readers who love intense and unapologetically inquisitive stories like Raven Leilani's Luster, who appreciate a narrative bridging the liminal space between believed story and truth like Susan Choi's Trust Exercise, or who are searching for a book exploring the literary world and its questionable men like Sigrid Nunez's The Friend.

Ursula Villarreal-Moura is the author of *Math for the Self-Crippling* (2022), selected by Zinzi Clemmons as the Gold Line Press fiction contest winner. A graduate of Middlebury College, she received her MFA from Sarah Lawrence College and was a VONA/Voices fellow. Her stories, essays, and reviews have appeared in numerous magazines including *Tin House, Catapult, Prairie Schooner, Washington Square Review, Bennington Review, Wigleaf Top 50*, and *Gulf Coast*. Her writing has been nominated for Best of the Net, Best Small Fictions, and a Pushcart Prize, and was longlisted for *Best American Short Stories 2015*.
