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


The most personal book from the great German sociologist, distinctive in tone and playful without losing an analytical focus

With a look at the current erosion of German society, sociologist Wolfgang Engler writes his most personal book yet after his own deep inner crisis. With great openness and radicalism, he bears witness in a way that hardly anyone of his generation and background has done before in Germany. Books by French authors of recent years have provided the main source of inspiration, such as Édouard Louis, Didier Eribon and Annie Ernaux. Their descriptions of class and regime changes, social turmoil and political upheaval serve as Engler's touchstones as he recounts his own life and that of the society from which he came and into which he went.

Wolfgang Engler, born in Dresden in 1952, is a sociologist and was a long-time lecturer at the Ernst Busch Drama Academy in Berlin, where he was president from 2005 to 2017. His books published by Aufbau include *The East Germans – A Tale of a lost Country, The East Germans as Avant-Garde* und *Citizens without Work – For a radical Reorganization of Society.* His most recent release, written together with Jana Hensel, is *Who we are – The Experience of being East German.* He lives in Berlin.

Germany, 1974: the country has been divided for almost thirty years and in 1961, with the construction of the Berlin Wall, the "Iron Curtain" between the GDR and West Germany closed for good. Escaping from the GDR is more difficult than ever ... And yet the newspapers are full of reports about those who tried to leave anyway – and ended up failing. The headlines bear witness to the severe sentences imposed on GDR refugees and escape helpers. Exactly 50 years ago, the former ambassador in Warsaw and Moscow, Rüdiger von Fritsch, was an escape agent, too, helping his cousin Thomas and two of his friends to flee the GDR. Together with his brother Burkhard, he had meticulously prepared the journey across the Balkans over many months – and had become a decent passport forger in the process. On July 7, 1974, the World Cup final takes place in Munich, the perfect distraction for the long-planned escape to the West ... But will they succeed?

In his most personal book, the bestselling author tells of a time when nothing indicated a reunification between East and West. Tense German-German relations, an escalating Cyprus crisis and impending war between Türkiye and Greece are the backdrop to this dramatic piece of contemporary German and European history.

Rüdiger von Fritsch, born in 1953, worked on the EU's eastward expansion as a negotiator in Brussels. He was also head of the policy planning staff of the Federal President and Vice President of the Federal Intelligence Service. From 2010 to 2014, he was Germany's ambassador in Warsaw and from 2014 to 2019 ambassador in Moscow. His books *The Russian Way, Turning Point* and *A World in Turmoil* were *Spiegel* bestsellers.

A one-of-a-kind compendium of the universal mechanisms of power and rule

Over fifteen days and nights, the frail vizier of the Ottoman Empire explains the strategies of ruling to his nephew and successor. This is the framework for Stoyan Mikhailovsky's book for the Bulgarian people, written in 1897 and still untranslated today. Ilija Trojanow retells this great poem in his own language. With disgusted fascination, readers follow the vizier's blunt self-justification, which brings insights into the nature of power, while at the same time dragging them down into the depths of practiced rule.

Trojanow juxtaposes his narrative with a chorus of voices of important theorists of rule. These include classics of world political literature from Persia and Ancient Greece, China and Japan, Machiavelli and Shakespeare as well as contemporary authors. The result is a cabinet of curiosities for thinking about the nature of power – and how we can protect ourselves from its dangers.

Ilija Trojanow, born in 1965 in Sofia, Bulgaria, grew up in Germany and Nairobi. He studied law and ethnology in Munich from 1984 to 1989. There he founded Kyrill & Method Verlag and Marino Verlag. In 1998 Trojanow moved to Mumbai, in 2003, to Cape Town; today he lives in Vienna when he is not traveling. His novels such as *The Collector of Worlds*, *Power and Resistance* and *A Thousand and One Tomorrows* as well as his travel reportages are celebrated bestsellers and have been awarded numerous prizes. In Die Andere Bibliothek he has published: *Nomads on Four Continents: In the Footsteps of Sir Richard Francis Burton* (Volume 269) and *Through World and Meadow: Traveling on Foot* (with Susann Urban, Volume 370).

Georg Diez shows how the 1990s shape our present: Climate change, the wars in Ukraine and the Middle East, capitalism turned into an ideology, technology perceived solely as a threat, an exhausted democracy, economic inequality ... If we want to understand the crises of our time, we need to take a fresh look at the nineties. What began then continues to shape the world today. These events and developments form the framework of what for many seems to be a quiet, comfortable decade after the end of history, when the West won and capitalism became the mental infrastructure of the world. A decade in which we are, in essence, still stuck, whose failures we must continue to pay for today.

In his intelligent analysis, Georg Diez identifies the decisive tipping points of those years. And not only that: he shows how we can derive ideas and alternatives for the democratic, economic, and technological future from the mistakes of the past. Only if we manage to gain an understanding of the mistakes of the past will we be able to solve the problems of today.

Georg Diez, born in Munich in 1969, is a journalist and author. He has worked for *Süddeutsche Zeitung*, *Frankfurter Allgemeine Sonntagszeitung*, *Der Spiegel* and *Die Zeit*, and writes for German and international media. As a fellow of the Max Planck Society and ProjectTogether, he focuses on the questions of democratic innovation. He lives in Berlin and Stockholm.

A way to ensure security in the Middle East

Iran poses a challenge to world politics. The West has looked the other way for far too long and instead celebrated a nuclear agreement that strengthened the mullahs' regime. Iran's missile program was ignored, as were the disastrous human rights situation and the massive regional political ambitions of the "Axis of Resistance". Even when a revolutionary process began in Iran, nothing changed in the West's strategic short-sightedness.

Ali Fathollah-Nejad, one of Germany's most sought-after Iran experts, shows how Western policy is to blame for Tehran's unchecked quest for hegemony and the escalation in the Middle East. And he outlines the cornerstones of an Iran policy that betrays neither the values of the West nor its interests – and thus not only strengthens the democratic movement, but also makes a lasting contribution to regional security.

Ali Fathollah-Nejad is the Director of the Center for Middle East and Global Order (CMEG), which conducts research on a foreign policy that reconciles values and interests. The German-Iranian political scientist, who earned his doctorate in London, works on the topics of Middle East and Western foreign policy. Fathollah-Nejad is the author of the highly-praised book *Iran in an Emerging New World Order*. He is currently very active on radio and television with his assessments and analyses of Iran, including for *Tagesthemen*, *ZDF heute-journal* and *Deutschlandfunk*. He coined the term "revolutionary process," which has become astonishingly widespread and has since been quoted many times.

Russia's wavering power structure

Sabine Adler witnessed Putin's inauguration in 1999 as a correspondent in Moscow – and how the new Kremlin chief waged a cruel war in Chechnya while the West welcomed him as a potential partner. Putin is currently waging war again, he has passed his peak as head of state, and his country is largely isolated. Censorship and repression have been on the rise in Russia for years. Few people know the true state of Russian society and its leadership, because information on the subject is systematically oppressed.

The Deutschlandfunk expert on Eastern Europe has years of insight into Putin's dictatorial state, more than almost anyone else. Is the Kremlin leader's power on the wane? Who are the new political, military, and economic players? What do Russians think of their country? Is there reason for hope, or is the nation drifting into the abyss?

Sabine Adler takes a look at one of the most influential, but also most unscrupulous global players, and assesses current developments in Russia and Eastern Europe as a critical reporter for a large audience.

Sabine Adler is a long-standing expert on Eastern Europe at *Deutschlandfunk*. She reported from Moscow for many years, was head of the capital city studio in Berlin and correspondent in the Warsaw studio with a focus on Poland, Belarus, the Baltic countries, and Ukraine. During the events of the Maidan Uprising, she reported from Kiev. She also reported on the war in Eastern Ukraine and, since February 2022, on the Russian war of aggression against Ukraine. She has received numerous awards for her work, including "Political Journalist of the Year." Her book *Ukraine and Us* became a *Spiegel* Bestseller.

Two century-long lives between Germany and Italy that could hardly be more different

Both loved Italy – the way of life, the culture, the language – and were decidedly Italophile. They could have been friends. But the historian Eugen Dollmann (1900-1985) and the literature student Heinz Riedt (1919-1997) went in diametrically opposed directions during the Second World War: Dollmann was one of the highest SS officers in occupied Italy, Riedt an anti-fascist and partisan.

The author retraces their footsteps in Italy and Germany and also tells the post-war story of divided Germany. Dollmann, the "dictators' interpreter," remained undisturbed in the Federal Republic of Germany and cozied up to the secret services. Riedt lived in the GDR until the Wall was built, translated among other things Primo Levi's book *If this is a Man*, and spent the last years of his life on Procida.

The two biographies are not only a reflection of conscience and convictions in dictatorships but also tell of the suppression of German war crimes in Italy and the discrediting of those who helped to liberate Italy from fascism. Andreas Wassermann, a *Der Spiegel* journalist for many years, researched archives throughout Germany and Italy and was able to speak to the last surviving contemporary witnesses.

Andreas Wassermann, born in Memmingen in 1962 and raised in Ulm, studied history and German literature. For 26 years he was an editor at *Der Spiegel* in Dresden, Frankfurt am Main, and Berlin. Various investigative research projects also took him to Italy. Wassermann was presented with the German Reporter Award in 2017.

A topographical journey through 20th-century Berlin

The city of Berlin was all too often at the center of events in the 20th century. Berlin was, in turn, a democratic, a fascist, and a socialist capital city. From here, two world wars were carried out into the world, which backfired heavily upon the city. The Cold War came to a head in Berlin before reaching its symbolic end there. The city stood at the center of world history, much like Rome two thousand years ago, hence Berlin being considered the Rome of contemporary history.

Until the coronavirus pandemic, more and more tourists visited the city on the Spree every year. They come not only for Berlin's party scene, but also for its rich cultural and memorial landscape. Berlin's often fractured history in the 20th century has become a unique feature of the location. The Rome of contemporary history is part of the city's branding, but it is more than just a marketing term.

Hanno Hochmuth approaches Berlin's past and present in a topographical and photographic manner. Based on popular perceptions of the city, he visits 51 selected places of remembrance and tells the story of Berlin in the 20th century

Hanno Hochmuth, born in East Berlin in 1977, studied history in Berlin and Minneapolis and completed his doctorate at the Free University of Berlin. He is a historian at the Leibniz Centre for Contemporary History Potsdam (ZZF) and teaches Public History at the FU Berlin. His publications are on Berlin's contemporary history and public history, including *City History as Contemporary History – Berlin in the 20th Century* (ed. with Paul Nolte, Göttingen 2019), and *Dream and Trauma – The Occupation and Evacuation of Mainzer Straße in East Berlin in 1990* (co-edv., Berlin 2020).

A young generation in search of a free and self-determined life

Friday, 10 April 1981: In Jena, East Germany, 23-year-old Matthias Domaschk boards the express train to Berlin. He's on his way to a birthday party. But he never arrives, because the packed train is stopped in Jüterbog and Matthias and three other residents of Jena are arrested. Two days later, he lies dead in the visitors' room of the Stasi detention centre in Gera. What happened back then?

Peter Wensierski captivatingly tells the story of a non-conformist young man and his adversaries in a totalitarian state, based on Matthias Domaschk's final days. He sheds light on how the police raid on a shared flat and the protest against Wolf Biermann's expatriation became turning points for the Jena scene. And he paints the picture of an increasingly politicised generation that went against their conformist parents and intolerant citizens, and who communicated politically and culturally across borders as early as the 1970's in search of an upstanding and self-determined life.

Peter Wensierski, born in 1954, is a documentary filmmaker and studied political science, history and journalism at the Freie Universität Berlin. From 1979 he reported as a journalist from the GDR and from 1986 to 1993 he was a television journalist for ARD and worked for various magazines. Wensierski has been awarded the German Film Award, the European Television Award and the German Cross of Merit. He has had several books published, including the bestsellers *The Forbidden Journey* (2014) and *The Incredible Ease of Revolution* (2017). *Berlin – The City of Revolt* (2018) was published by Ch. Links Verlag.

A psychoanalysis of the present

What can psychoanalytic paradigms contribute to overcoming current crises? Talk of the unconscious began with the decline of religion around 1800. One hundred years later, psychoanalysis emerged, which from the beginning was not only a form of therapy, but also an instrument for cultural criticism and gaining knowledge. Cultural scientist Christina von Braun and psychoanalyst Tilo Held shed light on the significance of the unconscious for social phenomena and developments, and survey key areas of discourse in the present day: from antisemitism and totalitarianism to changing gender roles, fake news, and conspiracy narratives. In doing so, they find original approaches and new perspectives on the most pressing debates.

Christina von Braun, born in Rome in 1944, is a cultural theorist, author, and filmmaker. She was a professor of Cultural Studies at Humboldt University and headed the Gender Studies program there until 2003. She has published numerous books, articles, and essays, and has made more than 50 films on cultural and cultural-historical topics. In 2013, she was awarded with the Sigmund Freud Culture Prize. Most recently, Aufbau published *Bloodlines: Kinship as Cultural History*.

Tilo Held, born in 1938, was appointed Medical Director of the Rheinische Landesklinik in Bonn in 1981, making him the first – and for a long time, only – head of a psychiatric clinic in Germany who was also a psychoanalyst. In 1990 he was awarded the Hermann Simon Prize for Social Psychiatry, and in 1999 he became an Associate Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Bonn. In 2001, he moved to Berlin, where he founded and directed the Fliedner Klinik am Gendarmenmarkt.





The world of classical music is attached to tradition more than any other art form or part of society. Beethoven, Brahms, Mozart, Verdi and Wagner dominate the stages of concert halls and opera houses. But why, even to this day, do women composers hardly appear on their repertoires? Since 2019, he has been writing the much-acclaimed series of articles 250 Women Composers for VAN Magazine, in which he portrays women musicians from all over the world and from all centuries – right up to the present day.
