


















Doris Dörrie *Mimi*

CHARLES JOHN HUFFAM DICKENS (1812–1870) started his professional life as a journalist. In 1836 his first novel *The Pickwick Papers* was published as a newspaper series – and numerous other novels followed. Of his famous characters, *Ebenezer Scrooge* remains so well-known until today that >a Scrooge< became a way of calling a miser and *David Copperfield* had his name re-used by a modern-day stage magician.



SAMUEL LANGHORNE CLEMENS (1835–1910), better known by his pen name Mark Twain, was an American humorist, satirist, lecturer and writer. Twain is most noted for his novels *Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*, which has since been called the *Great American Novel*, and *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer*.



ANTON CHEKHOV (1860–1904) grew up in a poor family with a father who was a strict disciplinarian. The children were made to get out of bed at five o'clock in the morning and were expected to work in the family shop before going to school. Anton, however, was soon to start making his own money: he created stories that were printed in the local newspaper and was thus able to support his family. Later in life, he attended to people in his capacity as a doctor, became a world-famous writer and travelled the world.



JOHN IRVING, born in Exeter, New Hampshire in 1942, now lives in Toronto. He is the author of 14 novels, including international bestsellers such as The World According to Garp, The Hotel New Hampshire, A Prayer for Owen Meany, A Son of the Circus and A Widow for One Year - from which the children's story A Sound Like Someone Trying Not to Make a Sound is taken. John Irving's work has been translated into more than 35 languages.


THEODOR STORM (1817–1888), poet and writer of novellas including *Immensee* and *The Rider on the White Horse*, was one of the leading representatives of poetic realism and one of the most popular writers of his day.
