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Mela Hartwig

The Lost Dream. Novel 224 pages, February 2025

A great discovery: Mela Hartwig's novel *The Lost Dream*, written in 1943/44: Mela Hartwig invokes a world of yesterday, in strong contrast to the terrible time in which it was written during the Second World War.

Barbara works with her husband in a laboratory in the bacteriology department. Their marital bliss is suddenly put to the test when Barbara catches sight of a man during a theater evening and suddenly becomes addicted to him. She does everything she can to get to know the young man, to get closer to him, to win him over. She risks her entire existence.

Mela Hartwig's novel describes a woman's attempt to break out of the snares of traditional roles and images of women. Barbara's drama takes place entirely in her head and is staged with extreme exaggeration and exaggeratedly stirring language. Part of the grand staging of this torn soul – and this cannot be described as anything other than a daring move by the author – is to use the kitsch register in order to add further loops to Barbara's spirals of thought.

Mischa Mangel

The Realisation. Novel

272 Seiten, ET 14. Februar 2025

Rarely are life and death, happiness and sadness and philosophical profundity so closely intertwined as in Mischa Mangel's novel *The Realisation*. It is a memoir by a narrator in his late 30s about the comings and goings of life. He takes stock in a poetic way and looks back with deep honesty. His shining eyes literally light up the reader when he talks about moments of happiness such as his own wedding; and the tears and sadness directed at all those who are no longer with him touch the heart.

The Realisation is based on the Buddhist practice of repeatedly visualising the transience of everything in order to live more consciously.

Andreas Unterweger House without Doors. Poems
