

Elisa Hoven (1982) is a professor of criminal law at the University of Leipzig. Her research focuses on German and international criminal law, economic criminal law, media criminal law, and sexual criminal law. Since 2020, she has also been a judge at the Saxon Constitutional Court. She has worked in Australia, Cambodia, the Netherlands, Switzerland, the United Kingdom and the United States during her various academic and research endeavors.

Lena Schätte, born in 1993 in Lüdenscheid, debuted in 2014 with the novel "Ruhrpottliebe". Over the following years, she worked as a psychiatric nurse in the Ruhr area until she began studying Literary Writing at the German Literature Institute Leipzig in 2020. Today, she takes care of people with addiction issues in Lüdenscheid – and writes. For an excerpt from the novel "The Grime on My Father's Hands," Lena Schätte was awarded the W.G. Sebald Literature Prize in 2024.

On the love for a difficult father and one's way into life

"Moth" is what the father calls the narrator. The father is a worker, gambler, and a drinker. In fact, Moth even has two fathers: one who can run fast, knows all the hiding places when playing, and comes up with an answer to any question. And the other, who is transferred from the factory to the office so he doesn't drunkenly saw off his hand. And about the alcohol, the mother says, it was actually the same with all the men in the family.

Moth herself has long been drinking more than is good for her. Even as a child, she played waitress at the local fair festival and drank the leftovers until she felt warm. Now, as a young woman, she sometimes sleeps in the hallway because she can no longer fit the key into the lock. Her boyfriend supports her, but he usually can't stand properly himself. Only her brother, who has become an educator, checks on her every day. When her father is diagnosed with terminal cancer, Moth looks for a way to say goodbye – to her father and to alcohol.

"The Grime on My Father's Hands" by Lena Schätte is a moving novel about growing up in a family living in so-called modest circumstances, which, when it comes down to it, sticks together. A tough, tender novel about the love for a difficult father and the path to life.



Antje Rávik Strubel is the award-winning author of the novels *Unter* Schnee (2001), Fremd Gehen. Ein Nachtstück (2002), Tupolew 134 (2004) and the episodic novel In den Wäldern des menschlichen Herzens (2016). Kältere Schichten der Luft (2007) was nominated for the Leipzig Book Fair Prize, Sturz der Tage in die Nacht (2011) was long-listed for the German Book Prize. Strubel was selected as the first Writer in Residence at the Helsinki Collegium for Advanced Studies. In 2019, she won the Preis der Literaturhäuser. Her novel Blaue Frau (Blue Woman) was awarded the German Book Prize 2021. She is also a sought-after translator from the English and the Swedish. On the pleasure of power and the power of deception

Hella Karl is the head of the features section of a Berlin newspaper. When Kai Hochwerth, the director of a major cultural institution in Sydney, kills himself, Hella Karl is in a state of turmoil, which she does not even admit to herself. She senses that the public will blame her for the suicide. After all, she has – quite contrary to her professional ethics and nature – set in motion an article and thus a debate about Hochwerth that pointed to his misogyny and ultimately led to his dismissal. But Hella Karl is not unnecessarily loyal, and she always got along quite well with Hochwerth. Like Hochwerth before her, Hella is now an outsider. But Hella Karl won't let herself be bullied; she fights for her reputation. But is she really not to blame for his death?

Juan S. Guse, born in 1989, is a sociologist and author. His novels "Lärm und Wälder" (2015) and "Miami Punk" (2019) were published by S. FISCHER. He has received numerous awards for his work, most recently the KELAG Prize at the Ingeborg Bachmann Prize 2022. He teaches at the Academy of Media Arts in Cologne.

One studied geography and works for minimum wage as a landscape gardener at a cemetery, yet he owns digital assets worth 20 million euros. Another one still drives his dented Volvo V70 station wagon, even though he sees himself reaching into nine figures soon.

Juan S. Guse spent a year meeting ordinary men who became wealthy through cryptocurrencies. Not developers, hedge fund managers, or crypto influencers, but simply guys who were in the right place at the right time. "A Thousand Times More Money Than You Have Now" tells their stories and explores what this kind of leap in social class has done to them, what drew them to the promises of this technology, why it's always men, how the desire for quick money fits into a society in crisis mode, why some dogs commit suicide, and how the author plans to reclaim the 2000 euros he lost himself in crypto.

Roland Schimmelpfennig, born in 1967, is Germany's most-performed contemporary dramatist. He worked as a journalist in Istanbul, going on to study directing. His first position as a director was at the Munich Kammerspiele. He has been working as a freelance writer since 1996. Schimmelpfennig's plays have been staged in more than 40 countries, to great success. Fischer Taschenbuch Verlag has published ten years of his dramatic work in the volume Die Frau von früher and Trilogie der Tiere. His first novel An einem klaren, eiskalten Januarmorgen zu Beginn des 21. Jahrhunderts, published in 2016, was on the shortlist for the Leipzig Book Fair Prize.

In a series of encounters and relationships full of imagery, Schimmelpfennig explores our longings and darkness, our hustle and bustle, our desire to love and be loved. Based on Arthur Schnitzler's "Reigen" (Round Dance), the novel is always about both: that we come together and then go our separate ways, that we are connected and then lose each other again and again. Sex is part of this very tension. As in Schnitzler's story, there are ten scenes that tell of couples; one of the couple in each case is the link to the next scene, until the cycle closes at the end with the return to the first person. It is also about closure and opening, everyday life and longing, marriage and fleeting encounters. Schimmelpfennig plays with the structure of the round dance, loosening it up – and above all, he transfers it to our present: to the life of the urban middle class, to fluid gender roles, to a world in which everything, including our sexuality, is shaped by new (and old) media and, above all, by violence.

Roland Schimmelpfennig has previously adapted the Reigen material in his highly acclaimed play "Seventeen Sketches from Darkness".

A new novel by Roland Schimmelpfennig, the playwright of the year 2024, who, with his passionate, yearning characters and powerful imagery, follows up on his successful debut "On a Clear, Ice-Cold January Morning at the Beginning of the 21st Century," which was shortlisted for the Leipzig Book Prize.


Marlene Streeruwitz's new novel: an homage to New York

Paul Maar is one of the most popular and successful German children's and YA authors. He was born in Schweinfurt in 1937, studied painting and art history, and worked for several years as an art teacher in a secondary school before devoting himself fully to writing and illustrating. S. Fischer has previously published "Wie alles kam. Roman meiner Kindheit". Maar's work has received numerous awards, including the *E.T.A. Hoffmann Prize* and the *Friedrich Rückert Prize*. Several schools have also been named after him.

A late story about a first love that never ends

Even as a child growing up in a high-rise housing project, Lorna, with her red hair and green eyes, was special: she was the best at soccer, always helpful, and took an outsider as a friend. For the rather shy narrator, she becomes his first great love. They move in together, go traveling, and make plans for the future: she wants to study psychology or social pedagogy, and he wants to go to art school. But then Lorna changes: restless, aggressive, unpredictable. At some point, she sets fire to the shared flat, in front of her roommate Katharina's door. Lorna is admitted to a psychiatric ward. In and out, again and again. Then the narrator lets himself be seduced by Katharina. It is the most consequential decision of his life.

For her commitment she received the Federal Cross of Merit in 2010 and the Bad Iburger Courage Prize in 2016.

Katja Riemann's first novel – about a world in which everything is in danger of disappearing

The musician Johaenne stands on her fifth-floor windowsill, and the cemetery is conveniently next door. The man has disappeared from her life, but the love for him remains. She realizes that she is not suicidal. She tentatively takes her first steps into a new life.

But the world is falling apart: a fog covers half the world, and fires and locust swarms rage. Johaenne flees from Berlin to a house in the countryside, cut off from all information. Her new friends Jamal and Shenmi, the pianist Ayo and a little dog join her. While the fog envelops the house, the four women sort things out for themselves. They set solidarity and love against a world in which everything disappears, and they set their will to assert themselves and be visible against their powerlessness. And Johaenne realizes that she must allow herself to be happy. And to live.







Thomas Mann, 1875–1955, is considered one of the most important writers of the 20th century. He received the Nobel Prize in Literature in 1929.

Mely Kiyak, a writer whose works include 'Frausein' and 'Herr Kiyak dachte, jetzt fängt der schöne Teil des Lebens an', was one of Germany's mostfollowed columnists for almost two decades. She ended her last political newspaper commentary with the words 'That's all there is to say.' The new edition of 'Deutsche Hörer!' is the realisation of a long-held journalistic dream for Kiyak. She has received numerous awards, including the Theodor Wolff Prize and the Kurt Tucholsky Prize. Her curated art salons can currently be seen at the Deutsches Schauspielhaus Hamburg and the Maxim Gorki Theatre in Berlin.

Thomas Mann's most important political legacy

When the Nazis seized power, Thomas Mann left Germany and never returned. In 1936, while in exile in Switzerland, the German Nobel Prize winner for Literature lost his citizenship. He emigrated to the United States, where he began broadcasting his anti-war speeches in 1940. In 58 desperate, fervent humanistic appeals, he spoke to the conscience of German listeners until November 1945. His radio speeches, transmitted by the BBC to Europe by adventurous routes, are unique documents of an upright German.

The author and his publisher: a whole life story

Thomas Mann claimed absolute artistic freedom and "adventurous worldliness" throughout his life, but with the same persistence he proved to be a man of continuity. Barbara Hoffmeister tells the brief story of his unique lifelong connection to Samuel Fischer's publishing house. She reports on the interplay between author and publisher, on expanding and unabridged manuscripts, warlike billy-goat songs or the practice of Weimar democracy. She also reads the bare figures, describes fears and challenges, shared successes and divisive tests in a fateful personal intertwining that extends beyond the generations of children and the exile existence of the publishing house and author on different continents.

Politics and literature: Hans Wißkirchen's great biography of Heinrich and Thomas Mann


"What are these two ignorant magicians talking about?" Golo Mann thought this again and again when he heard Heinrich and Thomas, his uncle and his father, talk about politics. But what about the political judgment of these two great 20th-century authors? How did these two sons of the bourgeoisie from Lübeck become ardent defenders of democracy? Hans Wißkirchen, president of the German Thomas Mann Society, paints a differentiated picture in his biography of the brothers, in which politics and literature cannot be separated and which, thanks to previously unknown letters, sheds new light on the period of their early exile in particular. Because both brothers are given an equal say for the first time, they repeatedly correct each other. Both come from the ideological space of the turn of the century.



Elisabeth Bronfen is Professor Emerita of English at the University of Zurich and Global Distinguished Professor at New York University. In 2017 she was awarded the Martin Warnke Medal by the Aby Warburg Foundation and in 2020 an honorary doctorate by the Friedrich Alexander University of Erlangen-Nuremberg. Elisabeth Bronfen's novel "Händler der Geheimnisse" was published in 2023. She lives in Zurich.

A whole new way of reading Shakespeare

The well-known English scholar Elisabeth Bronfen presents the definitive book about Shakespeare. Her entire life-long study of one of the greatest authors in literary history leads to a new image that breaks down his work on the basis of recurring themes: dream worlds, cryptomania, love suspicions, love wars, objects of exchange, war as a continuation of politics, politics as a continuation of war, female rulers, speaking bodies, male and female corpses, and: the last scene.

These elements are sought in all plays and understood as a "series", i.e. as the continuous development of a theme through all works. This allows her to show shifts, different solutions, etc., which Shakespeare repeatedly "works through" in his entire work. What does Shakespeare think about war? What about being a daughter? What about being a mother? What about jealousy? By extracting these motifs and stringing together the various passages in the plays, relating them to each other and discussing them in context, you get a completely different view of Shakespeare.

Herbert Beckmann, born in 1960, is a psychologist and author of novels, radio plays, and non-fiction books. He is a member of the German Writers' Association and the PEN Center Germany. He conducted intensive research on Hans Henny Jahnn's life for his novel. The author lives with his family in Berlin

Hans Henny Jahnn, writer, organ builder and horse breeder, runs the Bondegaard estate with his wife Elli, his sister-in-law Sibyl and their children.
