

Days of Glass


Two young women, two worlds and their dream of a better life

About the book

In 1901, glassmakers throughout the German Reich go on strike. The workers at the Gerresheim glassworks, the world leader in bottle production, also extinguish the furnaces - with dramatic consequences. They are evicted from their factory flats and live in temporary accommodation in the forest. Bille, the daughter of a bottle maker, and her secret lover Adam, like so many of their generation, dream of emigrating to America. But Adam is a strikebreaker, while Bille's father leads the strikers.

The second main character Leonie, the daughter of the doctor at the glassworks, also wants to flee from the life that has been marked out for her. She is constrained by upper-class conventions. Leonie seeks to be close to the artistic bohemians, but her father has other plans for her. As the strike rages ever more violently and conflicts between strikers and strikebreakers threaten to tear apart the social fabric of the workers' housing estate, Bille is forced to make decisions: Will she stick to her place in the family in the face of adversity or will she stand by Adam and her dreams?

There is a fire. In the forests and on the screens. Fifteen-year-old Era lives with her mum at the edge of the forest and tries to counteract the creeping process of destruction by documenting the extinction of the birds. In a stream, she observes her classmate Maja and her sister Merle blowing up hard drives in the neighbouring clearing. Maja is the daughter of two momfluencers who is trying to erase the memories of a public childhood. While Era keeps notebooks, makes drawings and tries to organise all the knowledge she has access to, Maja forms a destructive counterforce. Nevertheless, Era and Maja are connected in their search for intimacy and analogue stimuli. While the turtle dove dies out, the two fall in love with each other. But not only the birds are threatened: when a large-scale fire destroys the forest, the girls also lose a significant part of their habitat.

Hermann Burger, born in Aarau/Switzerland in 1942, was a publicist, private lecturer in modern German literature and feature editor. After publishing a volume of poetry and short stories, the publication of the novel 'Schilten' in 1976 helped him achieve his international breakthrough. 
The Escape Artist

About the book

The German fighter pilot Franz von Werra is a myth. A favourite of Nazi propaganda, he was shot down in the south of London in 1940 and was taken prisoner of war by the British. He tried to escape again and again until he finally managed to escape and, after an adventurous odyssey halfway around the world, arrived in Berlin in April 1941, where he was welcomed and celebrated by Hitler, Goebbels and Göring.
