

A Century-Defining Novel on the Power of Healing

Factory worker Anna is revered as a medium, Johanna Schellmann is a writer. At the Beelitz sanatorium, a bond develops between the two dissimilar women, from which both benefit - until the struggle for recognition and advancement turns them into rivals. In her incomparably crystalline prose, Ulla Lenze has written a great novel about the seductive power of self-redemption.

Hidden in the pine forests on the outskirts of Berlin lies the Beelitz workers' lung sanatorium. When the factory worker Anna Brenner and the writer Johanna Schellmann met here in 1907, it had existential consequences for both women. Anna is considered clairvoyant, and although the avant-garde of the imperial era is enthusiastically experimenting with the occult, Anna's growing following becomes a problem for the director of the sanatoriums. The encounter uncovers a deeply buried spirituality in Johanna, and she realises that Anna could play a key role in her literary work. But Anna does not allow herself to be taken in by anyone. Sixty years later, Johanna Schellmann tries to find words for her entanglements in the past, but only Vanessa, her great-granddaughter, sheds light on the darkness - in the middle of a luxuriously renovated Beelitz that is still haunted by the ghosts of the past. From the German Empire to the present day, Ulla Lenze portrays three women's lives who experience liberation and advancement and yet cannot save themselves from the threat of losing their importance.

A gripping historical novel, based on a true story

A German immigrant who becomes embroiled in a Nazi spy ring operating in New York City in the early days of World War II.

At the end of the 1930s, Europe is engulfed in war. Though America is far from the fighting, the streets of New York have become a battlefield. Anti-Semitic and racist groups spread hate, while German nationalists celebrate Hitler's strength and power. Josef Klein, a German immigrant, remains immune to the troubles roiling his adopted city. The multicultural neighborhood of Harlem is his world. Josef's great passion is the radio. His skill and technical abilities attract the attention of influential men who offer him a job as a shortwave operator. But when Josef begins to understand what they're doing, it's too late; he's already a little cog in the big wheel—part of a Nazi espionage network working in Manhattan. Discovered by American authorities, Josef is detained at Ellis Island, and eventually deported to Germany. Back in his homeland, fate leads him to his brother Carl's family, soap merchants in Neuss— where he witnesses the seductive power of the Nazis and the war's terrible consequences— and finally to South America, where Josef hopes to start over again as José. Eventually, Josef realizes that no matter how far he runs or how hard he tries, there is one indelible truth he cannot escape: How long can you hide from your own past, before it catches up with vou?

A summer in the vacuum of the old GDR reality. Pilly is thirteen and desperate for change. But her family is stuck in the past. With great poetic flair, Patricia Hempel tells a story about the end of a childhood and of a nation, about an uncertain future and about the gaps in our histories.

The Elbe border area, 1992. The mixing plants and assembly lines of the concrete factory are at a standstill. As is the life of the people in this fictional town on the water. While Pilly tries desperately to get the attention of the older Katja, her father is spending more and more time in the local pub. Her mother left long ago, supposedly to go to the West, although hardly anyone ever talks about it. Meanwhile, the old teacher from next door believes she is more closely connected with Pilly's family than anyone realises. There is still hope for all of them this summer. But then, one afternoon, the Vietnamese contract workers' gardens burn down. And suddenly Pilly finds herself face to face with a woman who claims to be her mother. Patricia Hempel describes a world in which there is no longer anything to hold onto, and which can therefore reinvent itself.

A whirlwind journey through cyberspace and the inexorable march of aging – and the eternal yearning to remain youthful – infused with subtle sadness and poignant nostalgia.

Juno spends her days helping her seriously ill husband Jupiter cope with daily life. She is also an artist, and dances and acts. And she spends her nights, on the frequent occasions when she can't sleep, chatting to love scammers on the internet. Martina Hefter has written a moving novel about needs and desires. And about how far we are prepared to go for love.

Juno chats online with men who proclaim their love to women on the internet and try to scam them out of their money. But instead of falling for their scams, Juno finds a kind of freedom in talking to these men. In these conversations she can be who she wants to be and say what she wants to say – supposedly without consequences. This is in stark contrast to the rest of her life, when she is always on the go, always worrying about Jupiter, always busy and tied down. So Juno occasionally escapes from her day-to-day life by going online and playing games with men who lie to her. She herself becomes a liar. But when you lie, are you not lying first and foremost to yourself? One day Juno comes across Benu, who sees through her lies just as she sees through his. And despite the distance between them, they form a connection. 'Hey, Good Morning, How Are You?' is a profound novel, but as fleet-footed as a comedy.

In Ginsterburg, the residents strive to wrest their daily lives from the events of World War II while the country celebrates the rebuilding of the Luftwaffe. Yet, how long can the subtle fissures in their lives remain concealed? This sweeping novel delicately and evocatively explores the intricate web of personal entanglements, love, family, and friendship during the war years from 1935 to 1945.

Lothar dreams of flying. His mother, Merle, a bookseller, can only helplessly watch as his dream of freedom leads him straight into the arms of the Hitler Youth. She distrusts the new era but cannot escape it, not in the small town bookstore, where entirely new books are arriving, nor in her conversations with Eugen, the insightful local editor. Other residents, however, know how to use the new power dynamics to their advantage, from Gürckel, the florist who rises to district leader, to Hansemann, the psychiatrist who sees entirely new opportunities. But soon, the depths can no longer be covered up. The war may be taking place far away, but in the microcosm of the small town, it is felt in every relationship. And looming over everything is the meticulously planned air war by Germany, threatening to bring disaster to the residents of Ginsterburg.






A melancholic-literary tribute to the culture of pinball

Flashing pinball machines are at the centre of Andreas Bernard's autobiographical account. His discovery of the machines in childhood. His forays through the neighbourhood bars, directed just as much by a mental map of pinball machine locations as by a knowledge of his hometown. And playing pinball as a way of warding off loneliness and boredom – and later as a catalyst for first love.

From the 1960s to the 1990s, pinball machines were found in almost every pub, bar and amusement arcade in Germany and the USA. They are a firm fixture in the films of the Nouvelle Vague and the new German cinema of Wenders and Fassbinder, as well as the early novels of Modiano, Murakami and Rainald Goetz. Using pinball machines as a unifying thread, Andreas Bernard tells the story of his youth and of a city in flux. The disappearance of pinball machines at the end of the Nineties reflects the far broader changes to the face of cities, and the end of industrial labour. »The Solace of Pinball Machines« is both a contemporary commentary and a literary memoir. 

Wolfram Eilenberger once again combines history and the history of ideas to take readers on a singular narrative and intellectual adventure.

»To write a poem after Auschwitz is barbaric,« wrote Theodor W. Adorno in 1949, the year after his return from the US to Germany. But wasn't the same true for philosophy? Do science, art, and democracy still hold any promise? Or has the time come to say goodbye to the very idea of humanity? Exploring the thought of Theodor W. Adorno, Susan Sontag, Michel Foucault, and Paul K. Feyerabend, four intellectual icons of the post-War era, and moving between Frankfurt, Paris, London, Berkeley, and New York, THE HAUNTED PRE-SENT traces the coming into being of a set of ideas that lead directly to the great fault lines of the present: from a debunking of blind faith in progress to conspiracy theories; from sexual liberation to narrow-minded, reflexive wokeness; from the radical avant-garde to the collapse of all distinctions between high- and low-brow culture; from a critique of technology to eco-activism; from the call for a new Enlightenment to the definitive deconstruction of Western thought and its idee fixe of human beings as defined by their ability to think. Or, put differently: from the ghosts of the post-War era to the present – increasingly haunted and more than ever in need of philosophy.

Wolfram Eilenberger was born in Freiburg in 1972. He studied philosophy, psychology and romance philology in Heidelberg, Berlin and Turku, Finland. In 2007 he completed his PhD. In 2011 he founded the Philosophie Magazinc. He hosts a TV show on philosophy on Swiss television and is the program director of Phil.COLOGNEC, a yearly international festival on philosophy. He is a regular guest on philosophical topics on German television and radio.



From Rome to China, from Athens to India, from the Celts to the Arabs: Raimund Schulz's groundbreaking narrative offers a global history like never before. Poor, but sexy? – 35 Years of Berlin's Post-Reunification History

Few cities have experienced as much as Berlin has from 1989 to today. These days, people wage religious wars without believing in God

For many people, religion plays no role in their lives. You might think we are living in the most godless world there has ever been. But is that really true? Hasn't religion long since found a different place in our world? Bernd Stegemann presents a highly topical stock-take of a world in which the individual has taken the place of God.

Without God, we are free. But where does freedom lead us? The world wars and totalitarian regimes of the 20th century, the climate crisis and mass consumption should give us food for thought. Instead, we hear shrill proclamations of the apocalypse. While our relationship with religion has been shattered into a thousand pieces, one thing has survived: an arrogant belief in absolute truths.
