

A lion cub annoys the nursery teachers in the daycare center and undergoes various measures to stimulate his anthropogenesis. A young woman has had a sunflower growing in her ear since she was a child, but she refuses to cut off the shoots. When she gets pregnant, things get complicated. A mother by choice, who deliberately raises her son without a father, smells contempt everywhere. In a scientific lecture, a program is presented in which overwhelmed mothers can swap their children and thus find an appropriate form of love.

Katharina Bendixen writes about parents and their children, about conflicts and overload, about the demands of motherhood and its contradictions. For that, she finds a wide variety of literary approaches: classic short stories as well as magical-surreal stories, experimental forms such as fictional therapy reports, exam tasks or the absurd minutes of a parents' chat group. She plays with the types of text that surround parents in everyday life, and checks out our stressed society.



Katharina Bendixen, born in Leipzig in 1981, writes books for children, young readers and adults. She has received numerous awards, including the Kranichsteiner Literature Prize (2014), the Heinrich Heine Scholarship (2017) and a work scholarship from the German Literature Fund (2020/21). She is a co-founder of the initiative »other writers need to concentrate«, which deals with the connections between authorship and parenthood. The story »My Time with Rosa« contained in this book was on the shortlist for the W. G. Sebald Literature Prize 2024. Katharina Bendixen lives with her family in Leipzig.

At the beginning of the 20th century, painter Max Liebermann purchased a piece of building ground on the banks of Lake Wannsee and, together with his friend Alfred Lichtwark, designed a house and a garden - a place to escape from the obligations of a life in public, but also a place of inspiration for numerous paintings.

Liebermann's villa will continue to change over time, and this fact is the starting point of Saiger's literary text, a local panorama captured in fleeting images and scenes that fan out into a variety of figures and voices:

After Liebermann's death and the forced sale of the villa – Liebermann was Jewish –, his upper-middle-class summer retreat is occupied by attentive employees of the Nazi Reichspost, who are sent to the countryside to relax in times of war. In the post-war period, the operating room of the municipal hospital is set up in the former studio. In the 1970s, an underwater club moves into the building, build an aquarium in the hall-way and spends evenings with music and entertainment at the bar in the former salon. And time and time again, hustle and bustle is followed by vacancy - until finally a cultural association develops the ambition to restore everything »as it was«.

Despite all the changes, the place always remains recognizable; it offers space for everyday incidents, life changes and dreams, it is the destination for lonely walks and a reference point for restlessly flickering memories.




Magdalena Saiger, born in 1985, studied German and history in Berlin and Madrid and received her doctorate from the University of Hamburg. With the manuscript for her debut novel What You Don't See or The Utter Uselessness of the Moon (2023), she was the winner of the Hamburg Literature Prize 2020. In 2023, the novel was nominated for the Franz Tumler Literature Prize, the Droste Prize and the blogger prize »Das Debüt«. In 2024, Magdalena Saiger was again awarded the Hamburg Literature Prize for an unpublished novel manuscript. She lives in Hamburg.

»What you don't see« accompanies an anonymous narrator who is leaving out of the blue, into the open. The existence of the text itself is a paradox, addressing an audience that was never supposed to exist. Written in Nowhere, an untraceable old coal mining area close to the highway. This is where the narrator finds an abandoned storage hall. It seems perfect for his plan to build a paper labyrinth that nobody should ever lay eyes on. He is driven by anger and fed up with the art industry, he aims for something bigger: a work of enormous dimensions, so big that it seems doomed to fail. But he is taking up the challenge with a fierce enthusiasm and the knowledge that perfection can only grow and exist in complete futility. Eventually, he meets his counter figure who he calls Giacometti. Giacometti is a rugged old man from the village that had to give way for the coal mining. He shows resistance against the course of things, keeping the village awake by telling its story while staring into the emptiness of the mine. The two men keep a close watch, searching for each other, but some distance always remains. Both dwell in and around the mine, becoming allies in the protection of the place against its discovery by outsiders. But the uncertainty if the presence of one will become too much for the other stays. This book is the literary exploration of the question of how far one goes.

Krampitz tells the real story of a commune that has fallen completely out of time, or better yet, out of the country, in the middle of Actually Existing Socialism, GDR. Some get help, others get asylum - from the bone mills of the state-owned companies, from a life in the stupid cycle of working, drinking, sleeping. No collective, no brigade, no political talk on Mondays. Instead, a community of equals where all money and all books and records are pooled together – as well as all infirmities. A community of cripples that perhaps is truly free.

At the end of the seventies, in the Marienstift Foundation in Arnstadt, a home for severely disabled people. Three friends who can barely move decide: We're breaking out! If we put our money together, our three pensions and our care allowance, then we can support two or three carers. The church just has to give us a house. And that's what the church did: They gave the old community center in Hartroda, a small village in the Altenburger Land.

In this unique housing community project under the roof of the Thuringian Church, Gruns is not the boss, not a leader, but rather a kind of Spiritus Rector in a wheelchair. And Bernd Mozek acts as his left and right hand, as his feet, if you will: as his executive. Just as big as Gruns, Mozek ensures that his roommate's free will has consequences in real life. One was given life before death, the other was given a life after death. Because Mozek is a former border guard who has accidentally shot a boarder crosser.

And there ist the blues band Mischpoke, all abled bodied, but part of the commune as well, using the church as their practice rooms, and one of the carers is their roadie...

While historians tell the story of the German Democratic Republic either from the beginning, starting with the founding of the state as a failed construction project by honest anti-fascists, or much more often from the end, with the focus on the Stasi, repression and oppression, this novel comes from the middle of GDR history. It is a book about living a right life in the false one, although the injustice in the actually real life is not ignored. It might even be the first attempt to give a literary form to the work of the Protestant Church, which shaped the lives of many teenagers and young adults in the GDR in the 1980s.



Karsten Krampitz has, among other things, published four novels, written for the Klagenfurt Ensemble and the Berlin Theater HAU, as well as longer works for Deutschlandfunk. His most recent publication was »Pogrom in Scheunenviertel« (Verbrecher Verlag), about the anti-Semitic riots in Berlin in November 1923. He won the Audience Prize at the Klagenfurt Bachmann Competition in 2009. He holds a PhD from the Institute of History at Berlin's Humboldt University with a study on the relationship between state and church in the GDR.

For his work on this novel manuscript he has received the Berlin Senate Scholarship for Literature as well as the Literature Scholarship from the Free State of Thuringia and the Working Scholarship for Authors from the German Literature Fund.

Hamburg 1951: Jazz pianist Martha Kiesler, once the idol of the swing youth ostracized by the Nazis, returns to Hamburg. Before the war she had studied music there, master class piano, but soon rejected Bach, Beethoven and Brahms in favor of Ellington, Goodman and Basie, and a little later she rejected Germany in favor of America. She even had quite a bit of success over there, but then her career in New York didn't turn out the way she had dreamed. But gaining a foothold in the war-torn German city is difficult. At first she makes a living as a bar pianist, in dives where women have wrestling matches in a mud pit and salesmen look for girls for one evening – until she meets an old friend who opens a jazz club in St. Pauli. When she finds her dream bassist, deserted black GI Paul Davis, a new beginning seems to be in sight. But it's not just real estate speculators, drug dealers and red light gangsters who get in her way, old adversaries also appear. And the memory of a mysterious death that had something directly to do with her...



Robert Brack was born in 1959 and lives in Hamburg. He also writes under his pen name Virginia Doyle. He won the »Marlowe«-Award of the Raymond-Chandler-Society for »Das Mädchen mit der Taschenlampe« (The Girl With The Flashlight, Edition Nautilus) and has been awarded the German Crime Award for the novel »Gangsterburo« (Gangsters' Office, Edition Nautilus). He has published more than ten crime novels, three of them true crime novels with journalist Klara Schindler as the main character, set in the 1920s (see next page).

A new biography of Andreas Baader, focusing on his radicalization, based on the prison diaries from the arson trial, which have been evaluated for the first time by the author.

In April 1968, two years before the Red Army Faction was founded, Andreas Baader was arrested in Frankfurt and taken into custody along with Gudrun Ensslin, Thorwald Proll and Horst Söhnlein for a nighttime arson attack in two department stores. Baader was barely ideologically trained or politically ambitious at this point, but he used the following 14 months in his prison cell primarily to catch up with what others in the APO (Germany's extra-parliamentary protest movement) were ahead of him: he read Wittgenstein and Marcuse, Marx and de Sade, he wrote a diary, reading excerpts, letters and script drafts. His time in prison can be understood not only as a process of radicalization, at the end of which Baader is released with a pronounced hatred of the state, but also as a process of education and becoming a subject, during which the prisoner sometimes has the feeling of being freer in prison as »outside«.

Alex Aßmann was the first to view Baader's prison diaries from the arson trial - notebooks running to over a thousand pages and countless letters, primarily addressed to Gudrun Ensslin. Based on this material, Aßmann approaches the figure of Baader and his life up to the arson trial in a way that is unusual in the previous historization of the RAF, juxtaposing many depictions of the pampered boy and later notorious criminal with a different perspective, and a personal one. He also contextualizes the development of an enemy of the state in the intellectual history of the Federal Republic of Germany.



Alex Aßmann, born in 1977, is an educational scientist. He published, among other things, biographies of Klaus Mollenhauer and Gudrun Ensslin. Alex Aßmann lives in the Odenwald.

Why are lesbians better parents? What goes wrong in the heteronuclear family? And why do the state and society find it so difficult to recognize queer families as full-fledged families?

This is not a guide. This book is a plea to no longer view queer families as deficient, but to recognize the fact that they actually do better than the classic hetero nuclear family. It explores queer parenthood and its diverse realities, which still have to contend with legal and societal discrimination and fear the right-wing backlash more than others. This book is also an analysis of the mechanisms that cement inequality in heterosexual families, even if self-image and aspirations claim not to. And last but not least, it is an encouragement to think outside the box and leave deeply anchored assumptions about parenthood and family behind. Lisa Bendiek uses her knowledge as a queer mother, that of her environment and the findings of numerous studies to draw a well-founded picture of different family models. It shows how traditional gender roles and a logic of »no alternative« in hetero-families still prevent care work and professional activity from being shared equally.

The author responds to resentments such as a alleged concern for the well-being of children in queer families with the same »empirically based cockiness« with which she suggests that heterosexual families should follow the example of queer families in their own interest: for happier parents and children and for a more equal society.



Lisa Bendiek was born in 1988 in Rüdesheim am Rhein as the daughter of a fulltime working mother and a househusband. She studied ethnology and psychology in Hamburg, Halle (Saale) and Paris. She works, among other occupations, as a trainer for feminist rhetoric and as an interpreter for the mobile victim counseling service for those affected by right-wing violence in Saxony-Anhalt. Her main job is as a speaker for anti-discrimination educational work, currently with a focus on raising awareness of racism-critical sensi-

tization for educators in Saxony. She lives in Leipzig.

Identity politics revisited – time for an emancipatory criticism

Just a few years ago, identity politics and its criticism of racism and other forms of discrimination were at the center of public attention. Discriminated groups came together and demanded equal participation in society. Topics such as German colonial history or the racism in everyday language were on everyone's lips, and previously valid classification criteria were called into question.

Then the political balance began to shift. »Woke« became a slur from the right, and weaknesses became apparent in the practice and methods of identity politics: an under-complex understanding of the performativity of language, the disregard for scientific standards, the exclusion of economic contexts and the reproduction of central neoliberal ideas. Since the Hamas massacre in Israel on October 7, 2023 and its anti-Semitic relativization, parts of the movement appear to be heading for political and ethical bankruptcy. How could this come about? Lars Distelhorst examines the basic philosophical assumptions and methods of identity politics and takes a new approach. A reversal in thinking is worthwhile, because neoliberal economization and its power mechanisms have not only penetrated deeply into our subjectivity, but have also successfully pocketed the previous achievements of identity politics. In contrast, it is important to re-politicize identity – as a tool for emancipatory criticism.



Lars Distelhorst, born in Georgsmarienhütte in 1972, studied political science at the University of Bremen and received his doctorate on gender politics at the Free University of Berlin. He is a professor of social sciences at the Berlin University of Applied Sciences. Most recently published was Cultural Appropriation (2021).

Yes, there have always been adoptions and appropriations of techniques, skills, motives etc. in arts and culture throughout history. We learn from each other, of course. That is not the point though. Cultural exchange is not the same as cultural appropriation.

Lars Distelhorst – from a white male perspective consciously so – writes about a subject that is as omnipresent as it is inadequately theorised, with an extraordinary potential to polarise. Ethnic party-costumes or dreadlocks, white soul music or yoga – are those cultural appropriations? Discussions tend to escalate quickly here.

Distelhorst demonstrates how the macro and micro levels of cultural appropriation are connected. He discusses various definitions of the term, including the alleged assumption of essentialist cultural concepts. He analyses three dimensions of cultural appropriation: looted art and artefacts from colonised people, the unasked-for representation of other cultures, and the consumption of culture as commodity.

Finally, Distelhorst relates cultural appropriation to anti-racist and anti-capitalist perspectives to use it in fighting against persisting systems of power and domination.

A book that encourages for future struggles and shows, behind the gloomy lethargy of capitalist realism, the existing possibility of a variety of other worlds.

The political present is paradoxical: While it is clear to most actors in politics, society and movements that it is impossible to continue as usual in the face of the climate catastrophe, an alternative to the status quo is more unimaginable today than ever before. The political imagination seems desolate, the vacuum of disenchantment with democracy is being exploited by the right.

Michael Hirsch and Kilian Jörg attempt to reforest the left-wing imagination - inspired by the concept of the »zone to be defended« (Zone à défendre - ZAD), which is notorious in France. The famous ZAD in Notre-Dame-des-Landes has existed for over fifteen years, an area that has been removed from exploitation contexts and in which people experiment with new social relationships, new relationships to work and ecology. Can these experiences be transferred to larger scales?

This book is a radical speculation: What if the state recognized and promoted the potential of autonomous zones - instead of fighting it? What would have happened if the 30,000 demonstrators in the forest of Lützerath had been offered a real say instead of police violence? What if we counter growing fascism with a new, serious form of democracy?



Michael Hirsch, born in 1966, is a philosopher, political scientist and art theorist. He teaches political theory and history of ideas at the University of Siegen and lives as a freelance author in Munich.



Kilian Jörg, born in Vienna in 1990, works theoretically, artistically and activistally on ecological catastrophe. Publications on club culture, the automobile, the political backlash and other religions of the toxic.

Every third day, a woman in Germany is killed by her (ex-)partner. But that's just the tip of the iceberg. Violence is an issue that affects us all - it is a fundamental human experience. While violence in the public sphere is subject to strong social control, it escapes this in the private sphere. The home as a social unit, as a social space of intimacy, does not always offer the protection expected, but often becomes an - intimate - arena of violence and dominance.

Barbara Peveling tells her story with unsparing openness. She has experienced domestic violence as a child in her family and as an adult in partnerships, which gives her social analyses a convincing urgency. In telling the story, she becomes an ethnologist of herself, and the writing of the book becomes a record of a process of realization.



Barbara Peveling, born in Siegen in 1974, holds a doctorate in ethnology and is an author and journalist. Together with Nikola Richter, she published in 2021 *Kinderkriegen. Reproduktion reloaded*. She lives near Paris and in Cologne.

Even as "growth" and "progress" are increasingly fetishized – as in the hype around AI – there is a nagging sense of going around in circles, repeating past mistakes. In this collection, Cole reflects on subjects as disparate as East German post-growth utopias, the failed promise of the 1990s, the fraught stasis of the lockdowns, the paradox of Zeno, the fever dreams of Big Tech and the "word machines" of Large Language Models. The lively dialogue between past and present can help tease out the snarled roots of current predicaments and open up new ways to move forward. Cole's essays, analytical, autobiographical and lyrical, have appeared in publications such as the Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung. Her recent venture into nature writing, The Gold Coast (Die Goldküste, Matthes und Seitz, 2022), was described by Die Zeit as "one of the year's finest non-fiction books."



Isabel Fargo Cole, born in 1973 in Galena, Ill., USA, grew up in New York City and graduated with honors from the University of Chicago in 1995 (AB General Studies in the Humanities). Her novel »Die grune Grenze« (»The Green Frontier«, published in 2017) was shortlisted for the Klaus-Michael-Kuhne-Preis (first novel award) and for the Leipzig Book Fair Award.

Cole has been working in Berlin as a freelance writer and translator since 1995, writing mainly in German since 2003, and has published stories in various literary magazines. She has translated, among others, major German literary works by Rainer Maria Rilke, Gustav Meyrink, Hermann Ungar,

Annemarie Schwarzenbach, Franz Fühmann, Friedrich Dürrenmatt, Klaus Hoffer, and Wolfgang Hilbig (long-listed for the 2015 Best Translated Book Award, a finalist for the CLMP Firecracker Award in Fiction.) Why are young women's bodies extremely fetishized in our society, on one hand, but on the other hand seen as a free resource that can always be assessed, that is available and to be consumed like a disposable commodity? In the world of the music (industry), it seems unthinkable that young women could simply be fans of the music, like the guys who might be hoping for a musical discussion backstage. No, in the general imagination the young women cannot be seen as anything other than sexually available groupies.

And: Why is it completely normal in our society that the fastest and most efficient career path for young women is through a relationship with an older powerful man? Why can old powerful men show off young women like a new Rolex? Admittedly, there is no other way for women to gain wealth and fame so quickly, and not just in pop - but is their decision really a voluntary one?

Now don't say, well, that's just capitalism – first of all, it rather smells like feudalism anyway; but if it were just that, then gender wouldn't play a role and young men could rise alongside older women in a similar way. But that almost never happens. Because these sexist and ageist scripts are so deeply inscribed in all of our ideas, that they can hardly be questioned – because their monstrosity is hardly ever even recognized. This leads to a tolerance of abuse and pedocrime, and conversely to massive age discrimination among female musicians.

Sonja Eismann's anger and rant about these conditions is extremely constructive and fruitful: a clear, critical cultural-scientific-historical-philosophical pamphlet has emerged of it, with well-researched examples.



Sonja Eismann, born 1973 in Heidelberg, is a journalist and cultural scientist. Eismann studied comparative literature in Vienna, Mannheim, Dijon and Santa Cruz (USA). In 1998 she co-founded the magazine *nylon* and has been a co-founder and co-editor of *Missy Magazine* since 2008. She has written as a freelance author for various magazines (including Spex, taz, Jungle World, Beton, Freitag, Deutschlandfunk Kultur), edited various feminist books, and has been teaching at various universities since 2007. As an academic, her research focuses on representation of gender in popular culture, third-wave feminism, gendersensitive (pop) journalism writing, do-it-yourself cultures and fashion theory. From 2016 to 2022 she was a member of the music advisory board of the Goethe Institute.

Surveillance does not have a good reputation. We think of the Stasi's sleuthing, or of surveillance in the current capitalism of tech companies, or of Michel Foucault's Discipline and Punish, and reject it unanimously with any data-based biopolitics. We have defended privacy, upheld data protection and shouted »my data belongs to me!«

What if we were wrong? Hasn't surveillance become the core activity of digital capitalism – perhaps the core of Shoshana Zuboff's surveillance capitalism thesis – and thus, in Marxist terms, a productive force? Our activity monitoring is primarily used to make a profit from it – and not to spy on and discipline us. As Chat GPT has impressively shown, all the data and information generated by humanity now tends to be fed into huge machines that continually spit out new applications. The appropriation of the fruits of this data extractivism continues to be private.

Do we really want to return to an unmonitored world – a world without the features of Google, Facebook, and Chat GPT? Is such an attitude of refusal a sort of first reaction to abuse and exploitation – as was the Luddite movement from the early days of capitalism? Wouldn't it be more important to bring these surveil-lance machines under our control, to explore their social potential, and even to expand it?

This essay advocates a change of perspective, it advocates a »positive surveillance policy«. Daum argues for seeing surveillance as a productive force that, rather than simply being abolished, should, on the contrary, be liberated from the shackles of capital.



Timo Daum is professor for Media Studies and Digital Economy. He studied physics and worked in the IT-sector for a long time. He holds lectures and seminars about digital capitalism, for example at the Re:publica 2017.

Agility is demanded by everyone in an increasingly project-oriented society under all circumstances. The new spirit of capitalism goes hand in hand with technologies and practices of measuring the self. The worker-entrepreneur or franchisee of digital-capitalistic business models becomes the role model. UBI becomes the more or less social social system of digital capitalism.

Today, software is being developed with agile methods: short sprints, working prototypes, new roles replacing traditional project management methods. This also has effects far beyond the industry: life itself is increasingly becoming a project. In the course of the "new spirit of capitalism" (Boltanski), self-optimization, lifelong learning, entrepreneurial validation of one's own workforce and biography, and indeed of the entire self, are managed with agility.

It used to be different. At the time of the normal working day, linear work and life biographies, the pre-re-corded linear sequence of school, education, professional life and pension, life spluttered like that. Today, on the other hand, the old waterfall model, in which successively different phases of the project take place, building on each other, not only in software development, has become obsolete. Setting milestones and being an achiever, a performer – not only has the wording become part of the subjectivity of the Digital Generation – we have become the product owner of our own life project, one sprint chasing the next.

"Timo Daum's book offers a history and critique of agile methods, puts them in context both historically as part of management's history in both dominating the workforce and increasing its productive output. The book gives an inside view on how highly collaborative code production in the agile factory is taking place, explores its predecessors from the division of labor through Taylorism and lean production, and concludes that the agile revolution has led to a kind of digital Taylorism for the general intellect producing mind-workers, in the global digitally connected sweatshop, what he calls the cogni-facture or cognifactory. Cybernetic management reaching a new stage in making human capital available for capital in an unprecedented way: Agile Capitalism."



What would Karl Marx make of Facebook and Twitter? If Marx were to return today, he would be faced with a paradoxical situation. On the one hand, there is the internet, a worldwide supranational infrastructure for communication and production, free and accessible for everyone; there are Unions, equal rights for women, free school education and progressive income taxes.

On the other hand, we would have to tell him, much to our regret, that capitalism still rules, that issues of political representation, social equality and fair distribution of resources still appear on the agenda. We would have to tell him that the admirable digital infrastructures are in perfect accord with a new capitalism that does not produce and sell industrial manufactured goods anymore, but organizes access to digital data.

Left-wing criticism focusing on mass surveillance and Big Data, or lamenting the loss of hard-won workers' rights is too short-sighted. Digital Capitalism is often criticized from a pre-digital position and either denied or trivialized as being bound to fail by itself.

The very first publication of a newly discovered typescript from 1952 – an astonishing satire about the nuclear arms race, the logic of preemptive strikes, and propaganda by Justin Steinfeld (1886-1970), a communist jew exiled in Czechoslovakia and England.

What sounds like a novel plot is the true story here: »Califa or The Love for Anna, The Power Engineer« is the previously completely unknown second novel by the exiled author Justin Steinfeld, whose »Ein Mann liest Zeitung« (A Man Reads a Newspaper, published posthumously in 1984, reedited in 2020) was considered his only novel so far. Jo Hauberg, editor at Neuer Malikverlag, had received the two typescripts from Steinfeld's nephew for publication thirteen years after his uncle's death. Hauberg published one of them and forgot the second one in a drawer for decades. But with a new war haunting Europe, with gas shortage and propaganda, he was reminded of this old manuscript, typed in London on an English typewriter on carbon copy paper, tied up with a paper cord. He found it and kindly sent it to Edition Nautilus, perhaps knowing what enthusiasm it would find. Because »Califa«, probably written around 1951/52, under the impression of the atomic bombs dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki and against the background of the nuclear arms race and the escalating Korean War, is not only a historically interesting document. It is also an astonishing political satire, a financial and military thriller. The story begins with the collapse of the American Stock Exchange after the currency standard was unceremoniously switched from gold to »C.L.F.«, quickly dubbed »Califa« – which happens to be the new material for atomic bombs – and ends with a nuclear inferno in Central Europe after a preemptive strike by Western powers due to the (false) assumption that the communist opponent also had the atomic bomb.

Steinfeld wrote in a kind of socialist realism that is sarcastic about Politburo meetings under Stalin, with a keen eye for propaganda, information policy, and so-called practical constraints, but with a bitter lesson: as long as there are nations and therefore nationalism, there will be war.



Justin Steinfeld, born in 1886 in Kiel, died in 1970 in Baldock, England. He spent his childhood first in Kiel and later in Hamburg. After completing a commercial apprenticeship, he switched to journalism and theater and was a magazine editor, theater critic and dramaturge in the 1920s. Steinfeld was a member of the Jewish community in Hamburg and close to the German Communist Party, although never a member.

In 1933, Steinfeld was taken into »protective custody« and was briefly interned in the Fuhlsbüttel concentration camp. In 1934 he managed to escape to Prague where he wrote for various papers of the German exile press. After the Munich Agreement in 1938, he fled via Poland and Sweden to Great Britain, from where he was interned in Australia with a number of other German exiled authors when

the war began. However, he was soon able to return to Britain, where he lived until his death. His novel »Ein Mann liest Zeitung« – so far considered his only one – describes the fate of German emigrants in Prague in the 1930s and is an important document of German-language exile literature.

They were promised a paradise there – in a land of no return. In order to raise the money for the crossing, the municipality had a forest cut down and sold the area to winegrowers. His previous books »Krume Knock Out« and »Fake Metal Jacket« were staged in theatres and made into radio plays. In 2015 an excerpt from »Krume Knock Out« was selected for the Festival of German Language Literature in Klagenfurt.





Roloff, one year older than the Federal Republic of Germany, is an ideal and productive subject, with an elephant's memory and an awareness of the connection between the collective unconscious and individual memory. Doctor Meissner, the director of the study, finds most of what his test subject tells him »very felicitous«, a mixture of historical and personal memories and playfully absurd still-dream logic. But then the memory of the sleep researcher Dr. Meissner himself gets out of balance...

Nipples are boring – or erotic. Normal – or scandalous. Everyday life – or court matter. What makes the subtle difference is the gender of the person whose nipples we talk about. And it is this subtle difference that repeatedly turns the nipple into a political issue.

When Gabrielle Lebreton from Berlin wanted to sunbathe topless at a water playground in 2022 next to half-naked men, the police were called and she subsequently lost her case in court. In the same year, activists in Göttingen fought for all genders to be allowed to swim topless in swimming pools, which was granted – but not on weekends. And while social media companies struggle to curb hate speech and fake news, female nipples are carefully censored. For fear of what exactly?

Julia Fritzsche looks back into the history of covering and revealing human bodies. When did the female breast become erotic, when did shame dominate and when did the urge for liberation? What makes Femen's protest a scandal, what is the concern behind #freethenipple and what do the feminist discourses about »topless« and Muslim headscarves have to do with each other?One thing is clear: dealing with nipples is political – and it's about more than just bathing regulations.

In 2021, an art gallery owner made Hans-Christian Dany the offer to write twelve texts for a lump sum, which would gradually be published online. No special topic required, no minimum number of characters. The assignment leads Dany to his own childhood, his relationship with his father, the bankruptcy of his parents' company and how they dealt and still deal with failure. The paid writing mutates from a literary journey into the disintegration of a family, which turns out to be a symptom of life in a sick country in post-war times. Dany writes about his legacy in a legal and a figurative sense, about emotional demands and liabilities between art and big money. What is ultimately written is also an attempt to determine Dany's own position in waning neoliberalism.

Where is society in Rojava today, a decade after the revolution?

For left movements around the world, Rojava embodies the real possibility of a better society: In July 2012, the revolution began there. In the three Kurdish cantons of Afrîn, Kobanê and Cizîrê, autonomous self-government was established, based on the values of grassroots democracy, gender equality and ecology. The »Autonomous Administration of North and East Syria« now controls about one third of Syrian territory. It unites different ethnic groups, religions and languages under one roof.

Since 2012, the region has had to defend itself against numerous threats. In addition to the military, diplomatic and economic disputes with the Assad regime, the main threats are the wars with Turkey and the IS. With the Syrian civil war, the region is also affected by an embargo, which severely affects basic services. Despite all these adversities, society has evolved and built relatively stable structures.

A decade after the beginning of the revolution, Christopher Wimmer examines the ideas and the reality of this »revolutionary society« from a critical but solidary perspective. Based on more than fifty interviews with people from all parts of society – from administration, the education system, the military, medicine, etc. – he creates a polyphonic picture of everyday life, in a mixture of reportage and analysis, showing the hopes and problems of local people.



She's finally done it! The "World's Worst Housewife" has left her partner and moved with her two children into her own apartment, or as she puts it: been gentrified away to the outskirts of Berlin. The main problems are financial: the truth is, it's really hard for ordinary mothers – with ordinary incomes – to leave their partners and set up their own lives.

Why does society make it so hard for women to leave men? Could it be that women in general, and mothers in particular, are not expected to be free? And if they do decide to fight for their freedom, they have to pay a high price for it.

Jacinta Nandi writes about slut-shaming and pity, the pressure to constantly justify yourself and society's pesky double standards. She shows us that it's not only the violent relationships that are shitty, that being told what a great dad your ex is isn't always helpful and why Isaac Newton was certainly not a single parent. She asks why married women show a lack of solidarity by baking ridiculously good cakes, and what it means to be a single mom by choice. Why do mothers always have to be perfect while fathers are somehow always good enough? What has to change in order for mothers to no longer feel forced to stay in relationships that are not serving them? Leave your husband – things can only get better!
