Hyper, Hyper: The 1990s are still around. It may seem as if the music of the final decade of the 20th century was mostly superficial stuff – remember Blümchen, Rednex, E-Rotic, and the Eurodance tracks collected on notorious samplers? At least the advertisements for 'Nineties Revival Parties' create this impression – but they are wrong. No decade so far has invented so many musical trends: There was grunge from Seattle, brit pop from the UK, crossover and nu metal from California, boy band pop from Florida, techno from East Berlin and even the first German hip hop from Stuttgart, Heidelberg, and Hamburg.

This simple idea may help to tackle a serious problem: In too many cases, the educational goal of analysing a literary work 'objectively' will spoil students' enthusiasm.
