

Steffen Kopetzky, born in 1971, is the author of novels, stories, radio plays and theatre plays. His novel *Risiko* (2015) was on the *Spiegel* bestseller list for months and was nominated for the German Book Prize, while *Propaganda* (2019) was nominated for the Bavarian Book Prize. From 2002 to 2008, Kopetzky was the artistic director of the Theatre Biennale Bonn. He lives in his hometown Pfaffenhofen an der Ilm with his family.

A tale of a spy, a dangerous technology, and love in the nuclear age.

London at the start of World War II. Simon Batley wants nothing more to do with British intelligence. Years earlier, as a physics student in Berlin, he worked undercover for them, leading to a catastrophe he never understood and the abrupt end of his love for his classmate Hedi von Treyden.

But the war changes everything. Agent Batley uncovers a new German weapon of unprecedented destructive power. Soon, guided by Niels Bohr and Rudolf Hess, he travels to the Third Reich to track down the enigmatic Hans Kammler, the planner of Mittelbau-Dora and one of the most powerful Nazis, who controls the German secret weapon program.

While trying to acquire German uranium before the Soviets and Americans do, Batley also pursues a personal mission: to find Hedi, uncover what happened in Berlin, and atone for his past.

A story of love and betrayal, the trail of a phantom, and a deadly primal energy: Steffen Kopetzky's thrilling novel about the hunt for nuclear technology and a man caught between guilt, love, and hope.



Sergej Lebedew (Hg.)

NO! – Voices from Russia Against the War

Sergej Lebedew, born in 1981, worked as a journalist after studying geology. His novels explore the Russian past, particularly the Stalin era and its impact on modern Russia. His recent works include the 2021 novel *Das perfekte Gift* and the 2023 short story collection *Titan oder die Gespenster der Vergangenheit*. Lebedew currently lives in Potsdam.

What does it mean to stay human when your homeland wages a brutal war of hatred and violence?

In this powerful collection, 25 Russian authors say no to the war against Ukraine. They offer a critical look at contemporary Russian culture, exposing societal issues and dangerous developments. These voices represent groups that are now particularly endangered, ostracized, and oppressed, often silenced or driven into exile. Through a mix of stories, poems, essays, and plays – sometimes playful, sometimes serious – they reflect the cultural and ethnic diversity that once characterized Russia but has now become invisible. The works explore altered daily lives, exile, guilt, and responsibility, providing reflections on moral choices in a time when one's country is aggressively targeting civilian populations – a reality also etched into German history.

Online, under the pseudonym Buchi Schnubbel, she puts a small-town's worth of people to bed each evening. Mit dir, da möchte ich im Himmel Kaffee trinken is her debut novel.



Lukas Maisel, born in 1987 in Zurich, trained as a printer. At some point he realized he would rather write than print books and went to Biel to study at the literary institute. For his first novel, *Buch der geträumten Inseln*, he received a grant from the Canton of Aargau, the sponsorship award from the Canton of Solothurn and was awarded the Terra-nova-Preis der Schweizerischen Schillerstiftung.

Russia 1983. Stanislaw Petrow leads a quiet life with his wife Raisa and their two children, Jelena and Dimitri. Every day follows the same routine – work, school, mushroom-filled piroshki for dinner. But what "Stasik" does at work is a closely guarded secret. One day, Petrow covers a night shift for an ill colleague and returns forever changed. On that seemingly ordinary evening in 1983, Stanislaw Petrow had to make a decision that could have determined the fate of the world.

Lukas Maisel's new novel plunges us into the Cold War era, where a false alarm in the nuclear defense system nearly triggered World War III. With his uniquely elegant prose, Maisel explores chance and destiny through this hauntingly relevant historical event.

Barbi Marković

STEALING, CURSING, PLAYING

Barbi Marković, born in 1980 in Belgrade, studied German Studies and initially worked as an editor. Her debut, *Ausgehen*, was published in 2009 as a translation from Serbo-Croatian. In 2016, her novel *Superheldinnen* was awarded the Adelbert von Chamisso Promotion Prize. For her fourth book, *Minihorror*, Marković received the Leipzig Book Fair Prize in March 2024. She lives in Vienna.

Barbi Marković has turned stealing into a cultural audacity and made it her program. In her new book, she reveals how this came to be and why, despite her open piracy, originality has rarely been denied her.

But it is also about the power and rhythm of a good rant. It is about power dynamics, self-imposed rules, and the balance between objectivity and anger – directed at no one in particular. It is about creating distance to bring the story closer. It is about how texts can end up knowing more than their author and offering insights beyond personal fate. How does that work? This captivating autobiographical essay provides answers.



Jacinta Nandi, born in 1980 in East London, is the daughter of a British Indian father and a northern English communist and feminist. She moved to Berlin in 2000 to learn German and has since become a TEFL teacher, single mother, and author. Nandi was a member of "Die Surfpoeten", writes for Exberliner, taz, and Missy Magazine, and founded the PoC artist collective Parallelgesellschaft. She is also a columnist for Süddeutsche Zeitung and lives in Berlin with her two sons.

Two Brits, two Germans, four single parents, and one major culture clash: Kayla, Tamara, Anja, and Nanna are friends who criticize and support each other with equal fervor. In sharply humorous episodes, we follow these women and their children through their everyday lives, from a kids' birthday party with cocaine in the family bathroom to a parents' evening with a crush on the new teacher.

Jacinta Nandi's debut novel, *Single Mom Supper Club*, offers a very British, zeitgeisty, and hilarious look at life, the bureaucratic hurdles for single parents, and finding comfort in the most unlikely places.

Steffen Schroeder was born in Munich in 1974. After training as an actor, he joined the ensemble of Vienna's Burg Theater before moving to the Berlin Ensemble. He has played many TV roles, appearing on several shows as well as playing film roles in movies. His book Was alles in einem Menschen sein kann. Begegnung mit einem Mörder (2017) received widespread attention. His debut novel Mein Sommer mit Anja was published in 2020, followed by Planck oder Als das Licht seine Leichtigkeit verlor in 2022. Steffen Schroeder lives with his family in Potsdam.



Ralf Westhoff, born in 1969 in Munich, is a director and screenwriter. His films *Shoppen* and *Wir sind die Neuen* were big hits, each attracting over a million viewers. He has won the Bavarian Film Award for his screenplays and has been nominated for the German Film Award several times. *Niemals Nichts* is his first novel. Rald Westhoff lives in Munich.

Love, a rural world, and the fateful power of knowledge – Ralf Westhoff's vibrant and intense debut novel.

At the beginning of the 19th century, two farms in the middle of nowhere. 

Lilo, a young goldsmith, has always had a strained relationship with her mother, Monika, and knows almost nothing about their family's past. But when a mysterious letter surfaces, revealing a connection to her grandmother Agnes, Lilo begins asking questions. Stunned by this revelation, Lilo becomes determined to uncover the truth. She soon discovers that Agnes had been imprisoned after the war – her own grandmother, a convicted murderer. Sarah Martens, born in 1978, completed a traineeship after her studies and worked as a newspaper editor in various media. For several years, she was part of the research team at *Stern* in Düsseldorf. She now works as a foreign correspondent. She has published two crime novels under a pseudonym and lives in Italy with her family, married to a police officer.

Emma and Daniel are living their great love and planning to marry next summer. But Daniel begins to suffer from back pain and is eventually diagnosed with cancer. Instead of planning the wedding, Emma starts the new year with Daniel's funeral. The loss is unbearable, and Emma withdraws into her grief. On her birthday, she receives an unusual gift: a small stuffed dog with "Sam" written on its triangular scarf. This was Daniel's idea. He had made arrangements so Emma would not lose all joy in life after his death. At a local animal shelter, a mixed-breed terrier named Sam is waiting for her.

Janne Mommsen was born on the Baltic Sea coast. Before becoming a writer he was a nurse, a shipyard worker and a pianist on a cruise ship. Now he mostly writes novels, scripts and plays. He lived in northern Frisia and often returns to take in the invigorating coastal atmosphere.

From the tides of life to the streets of New York: a journey across seas and generations.

On the island of Föhr, everyone knows Inge Martensen, who is almost 100 years old. Her milestone birthday is set to be celebrated with full honors. But just before the big event, to everyone's surprise, Inge takes off. Along with her great-granddaughter Swantje, she boards a ship bound for New York: she wants to see the Statue of Liberty one more time, just as she did as a young girl when she emigrated all alone in the early 1950s. At that time, life seemed already mapped out for the farmer's daughter from Föhr. With this journey, she hopes to help Swantje find her own path, and finally come to terms with what she has always kept to herself. Because no life comes without secrets ...

Tamar Noort was born in Göttingen in 1976 and grew up in the Netherlands. She studied art and media sciences, as well as English in Oldenburg and Newcastle upon Tyne and completed the Masterclass in Non-Fiction at the International Film School in Cologne. She has been making documentaries for ZDF, Arte and 3sat since 2009, with a focus on science. She won the Hamburg Literature Prize in 2019 for an excerpt of her debut novel Die Ewigkeit ist ein guter Ort. She was a scholarship holder in the Writers' Room Hamburg and in the Artist Residence Worpswede. Tamar Noort lives near Lüneburg.
