
### Ljuba Arnautović

was born in 1954 in Kursk (USSR) and lives in Vienna. After studying social pedagogy, she worked for the documentation archive of the Austrian resistance, as a Russian translator and a radio journalist. Her first novel, *Im Verborgenen* was shortlisted for the Austrian Book Prize 2018. In 2021 her second novel *Junischnee* was published by Zsolnay.

### LJUBA ARNAUTOVIĆ

After spending twelve years in a gulag, Karl returns to Vienna with his Russian wife and two daughters. In post-war Austria, people do not want to know anything about his experiences. He and his family have to climb the social ladder as quickly as possible. Karl sets about doing this unscrupulously, not only using his Russian skills but also the women surrounding him, marrying and divorcing according to how it benefits him. Those who pay the price for Karl's race to regain status are his daughters Lara and Luna who are separated and grow up in different worlds: one in humble conditions with her mother in Vienna, the other, with her father and his new middle-class family in Munich. The two girls, once so important to each other, drift further and further apart. In the end, however, they manage to find their way back to one another. Ljuba Arnautović writes »in clear, poetic language, without sentimentality« (ORF 1) about herself - and the upheavals of a century.

Elizabeth cannot ignore the misery of women who, in their despair, visit backstreet abortionists. She tries to abide by the law and prevailing morals while helping these women. But she wonders how far she is willing to go. And she's very close to her brother Eugene – the only person who knows about his affair with the wife of his twin brother Carl. When Eugene hides a family from the SS, he himself becomes a wanted person. Was it Carl who betrayed him?



### Mircea Cărtărescu


was born in 1956 in Bucharest where he still lives. His work has been translated into many languages and won many prizes, among them the Leipzig Book Award for European Understanding (2015), the Premio Formentor, the Thomas Mann Prize (both in 2018), the Premio Fil de Literatura and the Los Angeles Times Book prize (both in 2022), and in 2024 the prestigious Modello and the Dublin Literary award. Zsolnay published his *Orbitor trilogy*, the story collection *Die schönen Fremden* (2016), the novel *Solenoid* (2019) and *Melancolia* (2022).

### MIRCEA CĂRTĂRESCU

In 33 chapters, Mircea Cărtărescu interweaves the historical, the fantastical and the philosophical with spine-tingling stories to create a world that reaches into the present day and even the Last Judgment. Here, we encounter the Emperor of African Emperors, Queen Victoria of England, Tudor, an inquisitive child, the Queen of Sheba, and her son Menelik of Ethiopia who founded the oldest dynasty in the world.

### TOXISCHE POMMES



The narrator's family escapes to Austria because of the Balkan war when she is still a very small child. They find refuge with a family close to Vienna, but their host, a teacher, demands housework and 'friendship' duties in exchange for her hospitality.

So the mother cleans, cooks and waits on the host even though she is a qualified pharmacist.

Meanwhile, the girl's father, a trained engineer, can't find work as he doesn't speak German and thus becomes increasingly relegated to the role of father and house husband.

In the second part, the narrator blossoms into the perfect, ultra-integrated immigrant child, complete with citizenship, a university degree and a job in the civil service.

On her path to becoming the perfect immigrant child the wonderfully laconic Toxische Pommes parodies Balkan mentality and hipsterism, and exposes everyday microaggressions. A touching, funny novel that speaks from the heart to many people's experiences.



### EVA VIEŽNAVIEC



The short novel What Is It You Seek, Wolf?
by Eva Viežnaviec caused a literary
sensation in Belarus and was awarded the
country's highest award for prose, the Jerzy
Giedroyc Literature Prize, in December 2021.

The book sets off down the road like a modernday beatnik novel. On an alcohol-fuelled trip, protagonist Ryna travels from Germany to Belarus for her grandmother's funeral. The old lady was a traditional healer who was considered a witch by her neighbours and tried to teach Ryna the »arts« of herbal medicine. Ryna's inner dialogue with her beloved grandmother imperceptibly turns into a monologue. What follows is the intrepid 100-year-old woman's account as a survivor of the First World War, the October Revolution and civil war, collectivisation and Second World War – the entire twentieth century with all its atrocities. The story ends in the present, a time when Ryna has found peace, thanks partly to her grandmother's wealth of experience. Without glorifying events, this melancholic, harrowing book draws hope from the magic of everyday life.


born in 1957 in Rottweil, is Emeritus Professor of Modern German Literature at Queen Mary, University of London. He is also Founding Director of the Centre for Anglo-German Cultural Relations and of the Ingeborg Bachmann Centre for Austrian Literature at the University of London. ### RÜDIGER GÖRNER

Anton Bruckner (1824 – 1896) was a highly acclaimed organist. Originally from the Upper Austrian province, he celebrated success in Paris and London. However, his compositions garnered little attention during his lifetime; his detractors and opponents, most notably Johannes Brahms, disregarded and vilified them. Richard Wagner was the only composer with whom Bruckner, who suffered from self-doubt, was able to establish a relationship, albeit one that was contradictory and confusing. Wagner saw something in Bruckner's compositions that other contemporaries could not see. Ultimately, the heyday of Bruckner's music only came after his death.

Rüdiger Görner skilfully interweaves the life and work of the soloist Bruckner in a narrative style that offers a glimpse into the works and the soul of the person behind them. He powerfully illustrates how the simple life of this provincial, strait-laced anarchist culminated in an impressive musical worldliness that led directly into the modern age.



### **GERNOT BAUER • ROBERT TREICHLER**

Herbert Kickl operated in the shadows for almost three decades. He was the man who wrote Jörg Haider's speeches, and the fiercely disputed slogans that helped Heinz-Christian Strache into office as the Vice Chancellor of Austria. He has also been the only minister since 1945 to be dismissed from office. In the past, Kickl's radical rhetoric, acerbic argumentation and agitation stood in the way of his career. However, these characteristics now correspond to a zeitgeist that aspires to dismantle liberal democracy not only in Austria, but across Europe, with Alice Weidel, Viktor Orbán, Marine Le Pen, and other right-wing populists. Gernot Bauer and Robert Treichler have traced back this problem to its roots and provide a new perspective on an ascetic ideologue, a volatile platform for the people and an incendiary politician.




### Paul Lendvai,

Russia's war, migration, climate change, inflation and a second term of Trump? An apocalyptic mood is in the air again.
