born 1967, is one of Austria's most popular writers. He is the recipient of numerous awards including the Ingeborg Bachmann Prize (1995), the Arthur Schnitzler Prize (2002) and the Nicolas Born Prize (2017). Most recent publications by Zsolnay are the novels *Das Floß der Medusa* which was shortlisted for the German book prize 2017 and won the Bavarian Book Prize in 2017, *Die Eroberung Amerikas* (2021) and *Einsteins Hirn* (2023).

FRANZOBEL

In 1897, the American North Pole explorer and adventurer Robert Peary returned home from his Greenland expedition with two major attractions: the largest meteorite known at the time and a nine-year-old Inuit named Minik. Minik became a major attraction throughout the country. His story, from his early origins to his baptism and later path through life – schooling, foster parents, return to Greenland, alienation, and eventual return to the US – made headlines.

Franzobel illustrates the gulf between the
>civilized< world and an indigenous people, which
has become one of the most critical concerns of
the day, not least because of debates on migration. Minik, the novel's protagonist and a real-life
person, serves as an example in this nuanced
portrayal of post-colonialism. His fate shows
the struggle for survival of an almost completely
extinct indigenous people.

Violence no longer seems to exist; climate change has long since taken its course. An ominous quiet has settled over the remote community in which the female narrator lives. She no longer remembers her own name. To earn a living, she imitates women whose relatives are unable to get over the loss of their lover, wife or daughter. Then, during a new assignment, her world starts to teeter. Who is Emma, the latest woman she has been asked to impersonate? Are strange phenomena on the outskirts of the community an indication of its demise? And why is she so obsessed with becoming someone else?

Amira Ben Saoud's writing is highly evocative.

Underlying threats dissolve then intensify throughout her novel; in any case, the reader never feels completely safe, and right up until the end, we are never truly sure who the protagonist is.

A captivating debut that poses fundamental questions about identity and relationships and how we deceive ourselves.



Clara has died during a hiking accident. The only person with her was Paulína, the Slovakian woman Klara hired after her mother's stroke. At last, Klara's mother was taken care of. Klara was able to dedicate herself to her career again and her husband could enjoy his freedom. Meanwhile, Paulína's own children were being cared for by her motherin-law in Slovakia. Friedl Benedikt was born in Vienna in 1916. She was the granddaughter of Moriz Benedikt who was the editor of the Neue Freie Presse until 1934. After Nazi Germany's annexation of Austria, she emigrated to Great Britain in 1938, where she published three novels between 1944 and 1950. She died in 1953 in Neuilly near Paris.


Fanny Esterházy born 1959, lives and works as a freelance editor, translator and publisher in Vienna.

Ernst Strouhal born 1957, is a professor at the University of Applied Arts Vienna, as well as an author, journalist and the nephew of Friedl Benedikt. His book *Vier Schwestern. Fernes Wien, fremde Welt* was published in 2022.

FRIEDL BENEDIKT

Friedl Benedikt was not only a courageous woman and a scintillating author; she was also vivacious, energetic, curious and determined. Elias Canetti described the young woman, whom he met in Vienna in 1936, as »a born storyteller.« Until her early death in 1953, he was her teacher, lover and soulmate whom he urged to »write every day.« She followed his advice, also in London, where they were both forced into emigration by Nazi Germany's annexation of Austria. In England, she published three novels under the pseudonym Anna Sebastian, but her best work was found among Canetti's estate and is published here for the first time: a testimony of encounters with friends and strangers, street and pub scenes, trips through post-war Europe, and love stories. A remarkable discovery.




was born in 1956 in Bucharest where he still lives. His work has been translated into many languages and won many prizes, among them the Leipzig Book Award for European Understanding (2015), the Premio Formentor, the Thomas Mann Prize (both in 2018), the Premio Fil de Literatura and the Los Angeles Times Book prize (both in 2022), and in 2024 the prestigious Modello and the Dublin Literary award. Zsolnay published his *Orbitor trilogy*, the story collection *Die schönen Fremden* (2016), the novel *Solenoid* (2019) and *Melancolia* (2022).

MIRCEA CĂRTĂRESCU

In 33 chapters, Mircea Cărtărescu interweaves the historical, the fantastical and the philosophical with spine-tingling stories to create a world that reaches into the present day and even the Last Judgment. Here, we encounter the Emperor of African Emperors, Queen Victoria of England, Tudor, an inquisitive child, the Queen of Sheba, and her son Menelik of Ethiopia who founded the oldest dynasty in the world.

»The barrel of the pistol still in his mouth, his brain scattered on the red table.« On Easter Sunday in 1868, before the British colonial army razed the mountain fortress of Magdala and took the Ethiopian Emperor Theodoros hostage, the ruler put an end to his own life. By portraying Theodoros in three different roles, Cărtărescu shows him as a crowned despot, a looting pirate in the Aegean and his humble beginnings as a servant boy from Wallachia. An epic novel by one of the most eloquent writers in the world.

While Ana's relatives are only interested in the legendary house for very different reasons, Ana wants to find one thing in particular: the peacock painting, a family heirloom that her father talked about very often. 
Ljuba Arnautović

After studying social pedagogy, she worked for the documentation archive of the Austrian resistance, as a Russian translator and a radio journalist. Her first novel, *Im Verborgenen* was shortlisted for the Austrian Book Prize 2018. In 2021 her second novel *Junischnee* was published by Zsolnay.

LJUBA ARNAUTOVIĆ

After spending twelve years in a gulag, Karl returns to Vienna with his Russian wife and two daughters. In post-war Austria, people do not want to know anything about his experiences. He and his family have to climb the social ladder as quickly as possible. Karl sets about doing this unscrupulously, not only using his Russian skills but also the women surrounding him, marrying and divorcing according to how it benefits him. Those who pay the price for Karl's race to regain status are his daughters Lara and Luna who are separated and grow up in different worlds: one in humble conditions with her mother in Vienna, the other, with her father and his new middle-class family in Munich. The two girls, once so important to each other, drift further and further apart. In the end, however, they manage to find their way back to one another. Ljuba Arnautović writes »in clear, poetic language, without sentimentality« (ORF 1) about herself - and the upheavals of a century.



GERNOT BAUER • ROBERT TREICHLER

Herbert Kickl operated in the shadows for almost three decades. He was the man who wrote Jörg Haider's speeches, and the fiercely disputed slogans that helped Heinz-Christian Strache into office as the Vice Chancellor of Austria. He has also been the only minister since 1945 to be dismissed from office. In the past, Kickl's radical rhetoric, acerbic argumentation and agitation stood in the way of his career. However, these characteristics now correspond to a zeitgeist that aspires to dismantle liberal democracy not only in Austria, but across Europe, with Alice Weidel, Viktor Orbán, Marine Le Pen, and other right-wing populists. Gernot Bauer and Robert Treichler have traced back this problem to its roots and provide a new perspective on an ascetic ideologue, a volatile platform for the people and an incendiary politician.
