





The war is over - can love begin?

Spring 1945, Europe lies in ruins. Anni flees the burning city of Dresden with her young daughter and the half-Jewish violinist Adam. Their journey leads them through occupied Germany to her deceased husband's family in Tyrol. There they are faced with a momentous decision: If Anni wants to stay, Adam has to go. Her twin brother Tristan has narrowly escaped death and is now in an English POW camp. Despite facing immense hostility from her fellow countrymen, the British nurse Rosalie cares for him – but their blossoming love is forbidden under the law and by Rosalie's own family.
